CAN THEY USE NORTH CHANNEL?

Mr. W. W. Walker Has Made Out a Case St. Lawrence Navigators Are in Luck.

It will be remembered that during the construction of the International Bridge across the St. Lawrence at Cornwall, built by the Phoenix Bridge Company for the Ottawa and New York Railway, it was stated that the company would require the north channel of the river for the navigation. This raised a storm among the St. Lawrence Navigators, who have an extensive fleet of boats, and Messrs. H. A. Calvin of the Calvin Company and R. T. Walker, Q. C., counsel for the former company, as well as the Collins' Bay Shipping Company, left Kingston for Cornwall in connection with the dispute.

Mr. Walker thinks there is a possibility of employing the north channel of the river, so far as the current is concerned, as a far more direct route than the south channel. He is now in the city of the Grand Lodge, A. F. & M. M., of which he is a Past Grand Master, to see the chairman of the Reception Committee to meet the delegates from Michigan.

How They Proceeded.

He was seen by a World reporter and described the operation of testing the ability of using the north channel. After referring to the difficulty, Mr. Walker said:

"Saturday last Calvin and myself went to Cornwall and interviewed the authorities, and as a result, we were told that the distance of the north channel is about 10 miles less than the south channel. A very rapid current flows from the foot of the Long Sand, He is towards the south shore around the point, runs seven miles an hour, and I saw what serious obstacles to the navigation were, the drags of the cable came down the rapids, and were taken care of by one of the Calvin Company's steamers. Then the drags in a section of the north channel were towed by the tug into the north channel over a quarter of a mile of still water and passed down the river by that route. In this way we proved that the north channel is practicable as a route."

The Phoenix Company expect to keep on with their work six weeks, when the objectionable false piers will be removed, and the officers of the company state that, owing to the rapidity of the current, they have never had a more difficult piece of work on hand. In fact, they are now working on the north channel, and are now meeting the force of the current.

"The result of the trip," said Mr. Walker, in answer to a question, in proving that the north channel can be used with top power, though, of course, the south channel will also be utilized. The space the rafts must have to get into the north channel is about a quarter of a mile over still water."

THE IRENE'S TROUBLES.

German Warship Appears to Be Making Matters Unpleasant.

New York, July 18.—(Special.) John Bar, Minister to Manila, July 14, via Hong Kong, July 18, as follows, with reference to the Irene affair: A high German naval officer informed me the Irene did not proceed to Manila, but merely refused to acknowledge the insurgent flag.
