Chelsea, Mass., Jan. 8 .- Joseph Hart, Samuel Goldstein, David Karner, David Werblinsky and Terety Silverman were crested here to-day charged with stealing arrested here to-day charged with stealing in broad daylight a safe containing \$1300 in money and \$2000 worth of jeweiry from the office of Morse Bros. of Boston.
