## Parliament Is Not Likely To Convene Before February

OTTAWA, Dec. 1.—It is now believed to be practically certain that Parliament will not meet in regular session before the month of February.

While the various governmental departments are engaged in the preparation of the estimates for the next fiscal year, no consideration as yet has been given to the legislative program. The necessity of allowing the contractors and architects some extra time in which to make ready the new parliamentary buildings will be a contributing factor to the delay in calling Parliament, but it is thought that the month which will be allowed for this purpose has already been saved by the putting through of the Grand Trunk, prohibition and other important legislation before the prorogation of the recent special session.

The duration of the session will depend in a large measure on whether or not a Dominion elections act and naval legislation is introduced. Should these two important items be left over, as is quite probable, it is thought that the next session should not last more than three months.

## 450 WYOMING MINERS ARE OUT ON STRIKE

CHEYENNE, Wyo., Dec. 1.—Four hundred and fifty coal miners at Hanna, Wyoming, struck today. The mines involved in the walkout supply the Union Pacific Railroad and the city of Cheyenne. If the strike continues the railway will be without fuel. The plant supplying light, heat and power to Cheyenne announced today its fuel supply would last only two days.

## MOB POUNDS EULER UNTIL UNCONSCIOUS

Kitchener Crowds Amuck Beat M. P. and Ald. Bitzer—Both Seriously Hurt.

NEWS-RECORD SUFFERS

Newspaper Plant Wrecked—Quarrel Over Changing Name of City.

(Special to The Advertiser.) KITCHENER, Dec. 1.—Scenes of violence unparalleled in Kitchener were witnessed here tonight when mob-rules held sway. W. D. Euler, M.P., and Ald. A. L. Bitzer were severely beaten by angry crowds. The office and plant of the News-Record was also wrecked by the mob.

Mr. Euler was pounded into a senseless condition, and Ald. Bitzer was "clucked" in the park lake for times. He was asked to kiss the flag, but he refused. He was then seized by the mob and beaten into insensibility. Capt. D. A. Macintosh, president of the G. W. V. A., attempted to protect Mr. Euler, and later assisted in removing him from the mob.

Following the historic council meeting at which the name-changing question was forever put on the shelf, Ald. Bitzer, to whom was attributed the starting of the agitation for "Berlin," was made to kiss the Union Jack, and subsequently torn from the hands of P. C. Blevins and rushed to the lake in Victoria Park and ducked four times.

The row started in the council chambers, following the turning down of the clause to submit a plebiscite on the name question. Aldermen Bitzer and Bowman, knowing the temper of the mob in the chamber, stayed in the committee room refusing to come into the meeting and vote. As soon as the aldermen unanimously turned down the plebiscite clause a portion of the mob invaded the committee room and dragged Aldermen Bowman and Bitzer into the council chamber.

Struck Few Blows. They were struck a few blows in the face, while the mob demanded them to vote on the question of the plebiscite, daring them to support it. The police interfered at this point and succeeded in getting Ald. Bowman, who had practically collapsed, away from the mob. He was placed in a cell and a special guard put on to protect him. Bitzer was dragged from the council chamber and rushed to the G. W. V. A. hall, where he was made to kiss the flag. A Union Jack was pinned to his

coat and he was marched from the building. P. C. Blevins then got hold of the mob's victim and tried to drag him to safety. The mob rushed the policeman and took Bitzer, and later thrashed him in the lake. Upon the return from the park the mob assembled in front of the News-Record office, the paper edited by W. D. Euler, M.P., and practically wrecked the place. The excitement quieted down at this juncture.

Visited Euler's Home. Later the mob paid a visit to the home of W. D. Euler, M.P., with sinister intentions, but Mr. Euler was at the Lancaster Club. The mob then proceeded in the direction of Ald. Bowman's house on Church street, but with no results, as the alderman was enjoying the protection of the police guard-room. The damage done at the News-Record office cannot be estimated at present. It is known that the business offices are wrecked, a few type machines destroyed, and forms smashed. It is believed that the printing press is intact. The mob was the worst in the history of the city, and was fanned by the attempt on the part of certain section of the population to revive the name issue.

Editorial About Prince. The animosity against the News-Record office was occasioned by the Prince of Wales, in connection with the recent visit to Kitchener, which was as an insult to his royal highness by the News-Record and other organizations. The News-Record took no part in the revival of the name-changing issue.

The mob, failing to reach Ald. Bowman, proceeded to the residence of Ald. Asmusen, recently elected to represent North Waterloo in the Ontario Legislature. It is alleged by some in the crowd that when the mob M.L.A.-elect brandished a revolver and threatened to shoot if they did not leave him in peace. This fact, however, is not confirmed.

Ald. Asmusen, however, was dragged from his house and rushed through the streets by the mob to the G. W. V. A. headquarters, where he was treated in a similar manner to Ald. Bitzer. Ald. Asmusen at the G. W. V. A. headquarters apologized to the veterans, declaring that if there was anything he did against the veterans he was sorry for it. Ald. Asmusen declared in the G. W. V. A. hall that he was always in favor of the war veterans and he would not touch them. The mob respected Asmusen's person, and no bodily harm was done him.

## Anti-Reds Have a United Front From Caspian To Baltic

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The war office tonight in a communication concerning the situation in South Russia on November 25, says:

"General Wrangle withdrew his line to the west bank of the Volga River, but the Bolsheviks suffered heavily. One of their columns was surrounded and destroyed, and all its transport and a number of machine guns were taken."

"The Bolsheviks have advanced 50 miles south of Voronezh. Gen. Markhoff's division counter-attacked the Bolsheviks on the Kharkov-Kursk Railway, recaptured Rjave and advanced to 20 miles southwest of Krusk, taking 600 prisoners and six guns."

"General Denikin's army has now joined up with the Poles, making a united anti-Bolshevik front from the Caspian Sea to the Baltic Sea."

## VARSAVIA DINE DRURY.

TORONTO, Dec. 1.—The board of governors of the University of Toronto entertained Premier Drury and the other members of the cabinet at dinner tonight. The proceedings were private, but it is understood that the university in its relation to provincial grants and other respects was formally discussed.

## Hun Murderer Freed Under a British Ruling

Legal Department Holds Peace Declaration Must Precede Arrests.

LONDON, Dec. 1.—The story of the arrest, imprisonment and final release of Capt. Kaiserwetter, commander of the German submarine which sank the British hospital ship Glomar Castle, discloses a wide difference of opinion between British government departments as to what rights the allied powers have to punish the perpetrators of wanton warfare. The government legal department held that the Government had no right to detain Kaiserwetter during the life of the armistice, while the admiralty officials believed that they had the right to arrest such offenders any time and hold them for trial after peace was declared.

After the signing of the armistice Kaiserwetter went to Spain, where he obtained passports for his return to Germany. He made the mistake, however, of landing at Falmouth, where he was expected to board a vessel for the Baltic. Admiralty officers at Falmouth arrested him, and brought him secretly to the Tower of London. Every effort was exerted to keep secret the identity of the prisoner, but the interested in Kaiserwetter learned of his arrest, and promptly appealed to the government legal department, which found that England was not entitled to arrest him until peace had been declared. The examination was held in the greatest secrecy, and there was no announcement of the ruling.
