

Dempsey said: "Brennan was tougher than I expected. He stood up longer than I thought he would. His blows didn't hurt me at any time, but I found him a hard man to hit properly."

Dempsey's manager said the champion was not in the best of condition, having trained too hard.

Dempsey expects to leave for the Pacific coast tomorrow, to remain until late in February, when he will come back to New York to train for his match with Jess Willard on St. Patrick's Day.

The match last night broke all-records for receipts for an indoor affair in the United States, according to unofficial estimates today. The 11,056 seats/brought in \$209,852.50. This does not take into account the receipts from about 1.000 temporary bleacher seats and 2,000 persons who obtained standing room. The match between Dempsey and Willard, which was fought in an open-air arena netted \$452,522, the highwater mark.
