LIBERALS TO CONTEST TWO HAMILTON SEATS

W. H. Wardrope, K.C., and W. McClement Named - Gardner. Favorite, Declined to Run.

HAMILTON, Ont., April 23.-(Special.)—The cataract power magnates met the sub-committee of the aldermanic conference committee this afternoon and gave a written acceptance of the conference committee's offer to reduce the city's rate of percentage on the company's receipts on everything over \$316,000 from 8 to 5 per cent. in return for a new street rallway system.

The company, however, demanded some further concessions and limited the scheme of extensions.

Both candidates made addresses declaring that they wished to enter into an agreement with their opponents to hold an absolutely clean election and cut out bribery. 

TURNED FORTUNES QUICKLY John Henry Kern Made Thousands

OTTAWA, April 23.-Mr. Barker opened to-day in the public accounts committee enquiry as to the purchase of land in St. Boniface, near Winnipeg, for terminals and shops for the transcontinental railway. The purchase was made by the transcontinental railway commission. The total amount under examination was \$235,-

John Henry Kern of Winnipeg tified that he had purchased the lands as an investment pure and simple. He oresaw that if the terminals were not to be placed on this land the railways would have to traverse it, and for a parcel for which he paid \$59,000 he obtained from the transcontinental com-mission \$138,000. Another parcel of land for which ha

paid \$40,000 he got \$84,000 from the commission. The negotiations were conducted by Mr. Young, one of the transcontinental commissioners. On another property purchased for \$13,000 Kern and his partner cleared \$40,000. On a total outlay of \$59,000 Kern cleared \$122,800. He was sorry that he had sold to the government because the location of the shops at St. Boniface would have made his land much more valuable.
