PUGSLEY OBJECTS TO THE READING OF 'LIVES' CHARGES

For Two Hours, Dr. Daniel Is Obstructed by Technical Quibbles in Endeavor to Read Affidavit—Struggle Will Resume To-day.

OTTAWA, April 14.—(Special.)—Hon. William Pugsley's seat was the storm centre for two hours this afternoon in the house, and scenes of disorder approaching the Foster-Laurier jangle of ten days ago were witnessed.

It was all over the celebrated affidavit made by W. W. Mayes, dredge contractor of St. John, on the eve of the last election. The affidavit affirmed that Mayes was induced to withdraw his tender for dredging at 50 cents a cubic yard and substitute another tender at 55 cents, the difference of five cents a yard totaling \$25,000, going to George McAvity, a Liberal politician.

Dr. Daniel to-day attempted to move a resolution calling for an investigation of the McAvity-Mayes transaction, and calling on the government to take steps to recover the \$25,000 paid as a bribe-off to McAvity, but he was met at the very first with objections and the whole time at the disposal of the house was taken up with heated arguments over points of order.

Mr. Pugsley said all he asked was that the affidavit be sworn to and read by Mr. Hazen at the St. John public meeting he read by Dr. Daniel. Dr. Daniel said he was reading the affidavit with the corrected date and re-sworn to.
