

SALVATION ARMY HOLDS BIG SERVICE OF PRAISE

Immense Crowds Gather in Massey Hall—Memorial Meeting For Dead Soldiers.

Before a large and enthusiastic audience the special "Festival of Praise" of the Salvation Army congress took place yesterday afternoon, in Massey Hall. On the platform, which was decorated with flags and palms, were 250 bandmen, representing Peterboro, London, West Toronto, Wychwood, Young People's, Riverdale, Lippincott, Lisgar, Dovercourt, the Temple and the Territorial staff.

The meeting was presided over by N. W. Rowell, K.C., who spoke on the splendid work the Salvation Army has done in the missionary field. He emphasized the fact that the army had over 3000 missionaries scattered throughout Japan, Korea, China, the East and West Indies and Africa, and that over 10,000 native children attended special army schools. He praised the self-denial movement, and hoped that other churches might join in a similar undertaking. Commissioner Combs stated that as a result of the self-denial scheme over \$300,000 was raised by the S. A. last year for missionary work alone. Col. Mitchell of London, Eng., wielded the baton and vindicated his reputation as the finest conductor the Salvation Army possesses.

The memorial service was held in the evening, and long before the advertised time for starting the hall was packed from floor to dome. After the opening hymn had been sung a choir of 80 white-robed girls filed slowly to the platform, and amid the strains of the "Dead March in Saul," each deposited on an altar erected in the centre of the platform, a white flower. Immediately a crown of light sprang up from above the altar, and at the edge of the platform the word "Crowned" appeared in huge white letters. The choir then took their places on the platform and sang "I Know There's a Crown for the Young." After a selection by the massed bands, groups of representatives typifying England, Canada, United States, Sweden, Holland, Japan, India, Germany and Switzerland, and representing all classes of Salvationists who have died during the past year, marched to the altar and placed upon it a wreath of evergreens.

Commissioner Combs addressed the meeting and made many touching references to the memory of those who had been "promoted to glory" during the year. A series of limelight illustrations were then given, most of these being portraits of deceased officers.

Twenty-Fifth Anniversary Celebrated at St. Philip's Church.

At St. Philip's Church yesterday afternoon, the order of Canadian Home Circles celebrated their twenty-fifth anniversary. The sermon was preached by Supreme Chaplain Rev. T. Stannage Boyle of Chatham. The musical part of the service, under the direction of Mr. Fred Race, was excellent. The principal officers of the order present were: W. B. Graham, supreme leader; T. R. Young, supreme vice-leader; J. M. Foster, B.A., supreme secretary; T. M. Pattison, founder of the order; N. Somerville and M. R. Mowbray, supreme trustees.

Witness Wants \$100 for Expenses.
MONTREAL, Oct. 24.—Peter Patterson was not on hand when called as a witness Friday in the action for libel by Dan Macdougall against the Dominion Post Company. He is the international agent of the United Mine Workers, and was summoned and given fifty dollars for expenses from Sydney. This, he said, was too little, and he asked one hundred. The judge ordered him to appear on Thursday or he will issue a warrant.
