Children's Aid Society Will Appeal To School Trustees

OFFICERS ELECTED

Greatly Handicapped in Present Quarters—Hope for Larger Home—Question of Tenancy—The President's Report

The annual meeting of the Children's Aid Society was held at the shelter last night. The president, A. M. Belding, was re-elected to office. Mrs. H. A. McKeown was elected first vice-president, Mrs. D. McLellan, second vice-president, and M. E. Agar, third vice-president. Rev. George Scott was elected a member of the board of management and secretary. James Patterson was again chosen treasurer and J. King Kelly, K.C., honorary counsel. The annual reports of the president and treasurer were read and adopted. Rev. Mr. Scott, who has been acting secretary for the last five months, read his report for that period. Abstracts of all these will be prepared for publication later. An interesting discussion took place on the subject of medical inspection in the schools and a resolution was passed asking the board of school trustees to adopt such inspection as soon as possible. Another resolution was introduced favoring approaching the school board to ask for an interpretation of the law in regard to those children of school age who are not on the school registers.

The president's report was as follows: In presenting my second annual report as president of the Children's Aid Society of the City and County of St. John, the thought uppermost in my mind is the need of adequate facilities for the work. Our agent has been compelled to work in our own institution, but whom because we have no hospital wing

DEDICATION OF REREDOS

The handsome oak reredos lately erected in the Memorial Church, was solemnly dedicated last evening by the Right Rev. Bishop Richardson. Full choral evensong was sung by Rev. J. V. Young, priest in charge, with procession of choir and clergy the bishop's reredos being carried by one of the choristers. After conclusion of evensong and special lessons, the lord bishop addressed the congregation on the words "He is not the God of the dead, but of the living." He said these were solemn words which should be in our hearts during this terrible war, but the truth of the words must be in our hearts when we think of John Metcalf, a volunteer, not dead but living—alive unto the Lord. He spoke of his saintly life, and remembered the first time he had met Father Davenport when he came to the city as a stranger, and the great impression he made on him, his wonderful face, Christian character and charm of manner, and as he knew him better he realized what a wonderful addition to strength he was to the church in this diocese. He made the Mission church what it is and what it stands for, and the congregation will well in erecting the splendid reredos as a memorial to their first priest, he being dead, yet speaking for the beautiful work which he did for the church and the congregation. He is a great example to all.

TO VOTE AGAIN ON CONSCRIPTION IN AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, Nov. 8, via Reuter's Ottawa Agency—The newspapers warmly applauded the government's decision to allow another referendum on conscription, but deplore the delay which it involves.

The newspapers declare that the government should stake its existence and the life of parliament on the success of the referendum. They stated that the soldiers at the front will again have the vote. The official Labor party, which bitterly opposed the conscription law, is now expected to fight strongly against the coming referendum owing to lack of funds.

Over twenty million pounds sterling have been subscribed to the Liberty loan.

Help we have received from citizens at large. With adequate facilities the scope of the work would be necessarily and very greatly enlarged. It is gratifying to observe that the children of the Children's Aid Society are progressing in Fredericton, Moncton, and Chatham and some other centres, and we may hope for a more widespread organization and eventually the appointment of a provincial superintendent of neglected and dependent children.

A year ago I laid emphasis upon the need of an annual enforcement of the compulsory school law, to the end that all children of school age might be brought into the school system, and the citizens should insist upon a strict enforcement of the law.

During the winter of 1916, I was especially fortunate in securing the services of Rev. George Scott as agent for the Society. Dr. Roberts, who did such invaluable work last year as secretary and acting agent, was compelled by ill-health to retire, and it was most opportune that Rev. Mr. Scott shortly afterward was free to take up the task and devote to it his whole time. He has consulted me daily in connection with the work, and manifested a zeal, a sympathy and discretion which have made that work of the highest value.

In order to facilitate the work of dealing with cases coming under our jurisdiction I was able through the kind co-operation of the provincial government to have Rev. Canon Armstrong and Rev. Father Duke appointed justices of the peace, so that sitting together they might deal with cases brought before them by our agent. They have not been called upon to hold very many sittings, but we are indebted to them for their deep personal interest and their readiness to act whenever the occasion arose.

The enforcement of prohibition lessened for a considerable time the number of cases, but there has been an unfavorable reaction of late, and I anticipate that the services of our legal commissioners will be required more frequently during the coming months.

Our thanks are due to the police authorities for prompt and hearty co-operation, and to Secretary Wetmore and the board of management of the Municipal Home, as well as to Magistrates Adams and Allingham, who have promptly dealt with county cases.

We enter upon another year with serious problems to solve, but with a bright outlook and the assurance of public sympathy and support. This has been a year of progress, despite the many difficulties encountered. For myself I desire most sincerely to thank the board for the hearty support which made my own duties comparatively light, and ensured the success of our united efforts, with limited facilities, to promote child welfare in St. John.
