THAT PARLIAMENT BUILDING SCANDAL

Liberal Members of Joint Committee in No Sense Responsible—Big Profit For Contractors in Percentages—No Excuse For the Waste

As regards the contract for the construction of the new parliament building, a Liberal member of the committee which has supervision of the work is authority for the statement that September 1, the date of the next meeting of the committee, will see the handing in of the resignation of himself and his Liberal colleagues.

After hastily demolishing the two million dollars' worth of masonry saved from the Parliament Buildings fire, the department comes forth with the creation that the masonry was unsatisfactory. The work, they say, was done and had to come down. The masonry is gone. The destruction is complete. All absolutely conclusive evidence has been destroyed. The evidence which the public have is the former report of the architects, "after a careful inspection," that the walls were sound, worth two million dollars, and would be a part of the new evidence. There is much at hand that is circumstantial. The demolition was carried out hastily and surreptitiously, without so much as informing the Joint Committee of the intention until it was complete. A suspicious attempt was made to excuse it by publishing a report to the effect that the intention had been made known to the Senate and Commons during the session.

FARMERS HOLD FIRM ON MILK QUESTION


In so far as the farmers of Kings county are concerned—and they have been supplying three-quarters of the milk that comes to the city—the price of milk will be advanced on Friday in accordance with the decision reached at the meeting of the Kings County Milk Producers' Union held at Norton last week. This decision was reaffirmed at a meeting of the delegates following a general conference between representatives of the up-country milk producers and several local retail dealers held yesterday afternoon in the Palmer chamber. The session yesterday afternoon was at times a lively one and the chairman occasionally found it difficult to restrain some of the delegates. The farmers were determined in their attitude and their speakers were in no sense uncertain in presenting their side of the matter. The meeting itself was productive of nothing beyond an interchange of views. Some three hours were spent in discussion, the whole question being raised fore and aft in that period. The local retailers did not say that they would not pay the increased price, but the farmers, at a subsequent meeting, made it clear that unless their demands are met the supply of milk coming to St. John, so far as they are concerned, will be cut off by Friday. It is understood, however, that in some instances farmers are held by contracts at the present price but according to information given to the papers, these are in the minority. The matter is thus more definitely before the public. The farmers say they will not recede; the local dealers, or those who were present at the meeting, say that they cannot pay the increased price unless they raise the price to the retailers. Thus the matter stands. Immediately after the general meeting a session for the farmers only was held and at this meeting the decision arrived at by the Norton meeting was reaffirmed, to the effect that starting on Friday, the farmers of Kings county will sell their milk to the dealers only at forty cents per eight quart can. This was passed unanimously and the delegation left

for their respective homes in the early evening trains. Agreement Between Sweden and Russia. London, Aug. 28.—An agreement between Sweden and Russia for linking the railway systems of the two countries by bridging the River Tornea, which forms part of the boundary between Sweden and Russia, has just been ratified, according to a Reuter Stockholm despatch. The construction of the bridge will begin September 1.
