WAS YEAR OF UNUSUAL Y. M. C. A. ACHIEVEMENT

Local Institution Reports At Annual Meeting

Healthy Condition of Life of the City—Fine Tribute to Generosity of the Citizens Who Made the Work Possible During Year

The forty-eighth annual meeting of the St. John Y. M. C. A. was held last evening, J. Hunter White, the president, reported that the year had been a very successful one. The meeting was conducted by the Rev. A. J. Archibald.

Harold W. Rising and James C. Henderson were the new directors elected for this year. The retiring directors, who were re-elected, are: W. H. White, H. A. Porter, F. Del. Clements.

Telegrams of congratulation were received from Chas. W. Bishop, of Toronto, general secretary of the Canadian National Council, and from A. S. McAllister, of Halifax, national secretary for the maritime.

The president paid tribute to the members of the board and finance committee, and to the very great help received from the secretaries of the National Council.

The chairman of the finance committee, Frank C. Smith, called attention to the fact that at the beginning of the year the committee faced a deficit of \$4,000, and that in view of the war situation, the outlook was anything but bright, but he was delighted to report that owing to the splendid work of the members of his committee and the generosity of the citizens, the old debt had been entirely wiped out, and that the current accounts were all paid in full.

Reference was made to a very good friend who gave the sum of \$2,000.

The president, on behalf of the board of directors, expressed their very warm gratitude to Mr. Smith for his excellent services by presenting him with a beautiful bouquet of flowers for Mrs. Smith and an assortment of fishing flies for himself. The president hoped that he would be as successful in catching fish as he had been in financing the Y. M. C. A.

The house committee, under the chairmanship of F. Del. Clements, expressed thanks to F. N. Brodie, chairman of the property committee, for the painting and cleaning of the dormitories; also to the bowling committee who furnished one of the gloves in the reception room.

Acknowledgment was also made of the contributions of the Ladies' Auxiliary to this department of the work. Through the year the dormitories were practically full all the time. There were seventy different men who were registered as permanent roomers, and some forty as transients. The receipts for the year show an increase of \$328 over the previous year.

For the Social Committee Harry McFarlane reported that the programme consisted of fire-side programme, social teas, mixed social affairs, snow-shoe tramps, skating parties, banquets and suppers, and the total attendance for the year was 1881. Ping Pong and checker tournaments had also been conducted, and social affairs arranged for the soldiers both in the building and at the Militia Y. M. C. A. Special recognition was made of E. S. Peacock, for his direction of the successful football tournament.

The report of the Boys' Division showed the work accomplished among some 800 boys at the most critical period of their development. W. C. Cross, chairman of this committee spoke of the very efficient service rendered by P. J. Legge, secretary of the Boys' Department, and the loyal support of leaders and committee men. During the season there had been 67 group suppers with a total attendance of 888. Special social events

had been planned by the High School Ker's Business College, and for boys from four of the largest factories in the city. The total attendance at all social events for the year was 1800. The definite religious activities in the boys' department carried out were conferences, Bible study classes and Sunday morning meetings. There were 14 Bible classes with 150 boys enrolled. The total attendance of 2008, and the total attendance of the Sunday morning meetings was also 2008. At all religious meetings held for boys there was an attendance of 4600 throughout the year. Forty-eight boys wrote on the Bible Study examinations. Over 100 boys made the "statement of purpose" on joining the association. This calls for observation of clean speech, clean living, and clean habits and to do something to "help the other fellow." The report made reference to the extensive physical department programme carried on for the boys.

The educational activities for this department consisted of fire-side talks on such subjects as "business success," "good citizenship," "camp craft," "personal hygiene." The school for employed boys had been conducted, giving them

a course in elementary arithmetic, reading, spelling and business English. The department paper the "Acmy" was published every month throughout the year and reflects great credit on its managers. The first-aid class is conducted by Doctor Malcolm with 22 enrolled. Five debates have been held. Six educational tours have been made to many of the important places in the city. The report also stated the significant fact that the boys' work secretary was also honorary secretary of the Boy Scout movement of St. John, and was also secretary-treasurer of the Provincial Advisory Committee for co-operation in boys' work.
