PREPARING FOR MUNICIPALITIES MEETING HERE

Beatty Hotel Will Be Headquarters; Sessions in Court House

Preparations are now being made for the holding of the 20th annual convention of the Union of New Brunswick Municipalities, which is to convene here, October 26, 27, 28. The headquarters of the convention will be at the Beatty Hotel and the business sessions will be held in the Court House.

The delegates will register on the afternoon and evening of October 26 at the Beatty Hotel and committees will meet that evening. Among those who will attend will be Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, K. C., D. C. L., Premier of New Brunswick. The program as arranged is as follows: Address of welcome by Walter W. White, M. D., L. D., Mayor of the City of Saint John. Replies by Ambrose Wheeler, Mayor of the City of Moncton, and Max D. Cormier, B. A., Mayor of Edmundston. New Brunswick—by request will reply in English and French, and W. B. Belves, Mayor City of Woodstock; annual address by Honorable Rupert W. Wigmore, Warden of the Municipality of the City and County of Saint John; addresses by Dr. Mabel Hannington, Medical Inspector of Public Schools—"The Practical Side of the Feeble-Minded Question"; Roy Balmer Liddy, Ph. D., Hart A. Massey, Professor of Philosophy, Mount Allison University—"Method of Caring for the Aged Poor." If time permits Dr. Liddy during the convention will discuss "Old Age Pension System for Canada."

PEARSONVILLE MAN SHOT IN ACCIDENT

Lorne Muir's Gun Believed Fired When He Tripped While Out Hunting

APPOHAQU, Oct. 1.—A shocking fatality happened this afternoon at Pearsonville when Lorne Muir, son of the late George Muir, was accidentally shot and killed by his own rifle while returning from a hunting trip. Young Muir had gone out about 3 o'clock this afternoon into the woods on his own land and intended to be back by supper time. When he did not return his brother, Wilmont, started out and went up through the pastureland looking for him. Following a path behind a little bunch of bushes he found the body of his brother lying face down through the right temple. The gun was lying beside him with an empty shell in it.


