

## BREAKWATER EXTENSION AGAIN IS URGED BY BOARD OF TRADE

### Other Important Matters at a Meeting of the Council.

The Council of the St. John Board of Trade held a lengthy session this morning, when important matters were discussed at length. President G. E. Barbour occupied the chair.

The secretary submitted a detailed report as to the co-operative results that had been received from Canadian boards of trade and chambers of commerce on circular letters issued by the St. John Board recommending that some of the points referred to in these reports be taken up with the transportation companies. The following resolution was recommended to be sent to the Associated Boards of Trade in Ontario:

Resolved, that the St. John Board of Trade, being firmly of the opinion from a national as well as economic standpoint, that Canadian railways and Canadian ports, if utilized to the fullest extent for the handling of Canadian commerce, can render potential assistance in the building up of the Dominion as a nation, also in the expansion of Canada's business and in the creation of a friendly and co-operative spirit among Canadians from the Atlantic to the Pacific, would recommend that special consideration be given to this matter by the Associated Boards of Trade and Chambers of Commerce of Ontario and that individual organizations be urged to follow the matter up with the transportation and insurance companies, local exporters, importers and manufacturers, also with their local newspapers, so as to endeavor to secure reduction in transportation and insurance rates and awaken greater interest on the part of shippers and the public generally in the potentialities and possibilities of Canada's ports.

The report and resolution were adopted.

The suggestions made by W. S. Fisher and A. P. Patterson as to publicity propaganda for this port and province received close consideration, and it was decided by the council to take up the matter with both of the gentlemen, with a view to deciding upon a plan to be recommended to the city.

A report on grain conveyor extension for this port was made by the transportation committee, and a recommendation was endorsed authorizing the committee to take up with the Government the matter of endeavoring to secure a grain conveyor berth for Pier 16 and that Engineer Gray be requested to co-operate with the committee on the subject.

The secretary reported that the matter of the sale of excise stamps by the post offices as well as by the departmental offices and banks had been taken up with the customs and excise department, also with the Postmaster-General, but no decision on the subject had yet been received.

It was decided to urge upon the City Council the importance of recommending to the Public Works Committee the need for immediate action on the

### extension of the Negro Point breakwater so as to protect the harbor and shipping as speedily as possible.

Special consideration was given to the matter of the Maritime Board of Trade meeting in Halifax on Sept. 11 and 12. The President strongly urged the need for closer co-operation on the part of the Maritime Provinces, and it was decided that a special effort be made to secure a large representation from St. John at the Halifax convention.

Resolutions were passed expressing appreciation of the recent visit of the British Empire Forestry Commission, also of Governor Cox of Massachusetts, and of the cordial reception that the city council gave to both. It was felt that both visits would be of benefit to the city and the province and would awaken on the part of the visitors a deep interest in this portion of the Dominion.
