DE VALERA IN THE WAY OF PEACE

Father Baker, Just Across from Ireland, Speaks of the Situation There.

Among passengers on the Empress of France to Quebec was Rev. B. Baker, who travelled in the third-class accommodation by choice. Father Baker, an Irishman by birth, has lived in India all his life, with his church headquarters at Simla. He said he came to this country for a three months' visit, and before leaving England paid a visit to his native country, Ireland. Speaking of the Irish question, he said it was lamentable and due to the perverse, impossible character of De Valera. The people of Ireland, or rather ninety-five per cent. of them, were with Collins and Griffiths, and if De Valera had been eliminated with the peace treaty pact, Ireland today would be in an ideal condition, with its population working together for the progress and prosperity of the country and happiness of its people.

the people of Ireland to accept a hand of friendship that had been tendered to them by the government of England. He had been told, and Father Baker specially mentioned a priest named Father Collins, that the blood of the Irish men and women now being sacrificed to his agitating whims would rest on his conscience. Father Baker, discussing the Indian question, said that it had no analogy to the Irish. The latter were a civilized race and close neighbors to England seeking the right of self-government, while in India conditions were altogether different. To begin with, there were twenty different nations, having different viewpoints on nationality and religion, in India, and the greater part of the immense population in that country were pagans and their strata of the lowest. The agitation in India would not end until the two great races, the Hindus and the Mohammedans, hated each other, and the hatred on the part of the Hindus towards the other was the enforced conversion of the Hindus by the Mohammedans. Speaking of missionary work, Father Baker said the civilization and Christianization of Indians made a complex problem. It was easy to make Christians of the lower strata so long as you remained with them, feed them and gave them money, but when you left them and they received no further assistance they went back to paganism. There was no such a thing as conversion of the high class of Indians. They lived for the luxury of this life and all its seductive propensities, and in this manner of living they were happy and content with the pleasure of good living and harem, and so long as they are not disturbed they would be a powerful friend of England. LARGE SUM TO GO TO WIDOW

Compensation for Mrs. Doherty, Whose Husband was Killed in Bombay Riots.

Bombay, July 4—Claims for compensation by sufferers in the riots of last November during the visit of the Prince of Wales have been adjusted. They total about six and a half lakhs (roughly \$211,000) the bulk of which goes to the widow of Wm. Francis Doherty, a U. S. engineer, who was killed during the disturbances.

Mr. Doherty, who had been a resident of Bombay for several years, was attacked by 400 natives while superintending the construction plant. Two men were sentenced to death for his murder.

SING SING SO ECONOMICAL IT ENDS YEAR WITH SURPLUS

Ossining, July 4—Although prisoners have been going to Sing Sing in larger numbers than ever in the last few months, when the prison's fiscal year ended on July 1, Warden Lewis E. Lawes announced that there was a surplus of about \$3,000 in the prison's funds.

For months the prison officials have exercised sharp economy to prevent having a deficit. So many new prisoners had to be fitted with wearing apparel that prison attendants had a difficult task to keep within the appropriation. The state appropriated about \$400,000 to run Sing Sing during the fiscal year just closed.
