## MORNING NEWS OVER THE WIRES

A strike is threatened at the works of Charles Fawcett, Ltd., Rockville, because of matters of difference between the management and the workmen regarding the question of reducing prices on certain castings when made or partly made by a moulding machine. J. H. Burnett, vice-president of the Iron Moulders' Union of America, has been in Rockville trying to arrange matters.

## MURDERED PREMIER

OF SPAIN AND MAN WHO MAY BE SUCCESSOR

Madrid, Nov. 12.—After a meeting of the cabinet tonight it was announced that General Weizer, captain general of Catalonia, and once commander in chief of the Spanish forces in Cuba, or Count Romanones might be appointed permanent premier.

Cardinal Merry Del Val, received news of the crime early in the afternoon, in a cipher telegram from Madrid. He went immediately to the Pope and communicated the news to him, using great precaution not to shock him. The Pope was deeply affected and expressed his horror at the crime, exclaiming: "This comes from stamping out religion in the most Catholic country." His Holiness then knelt and remained absorbed in prayer for the safety of Spain.

## FURTHER EVIDENCE

IN CONNECTION WITH BERNARD CRIBBS' DEATH

Five new witnesses were called last evening when the inquest into the death of Bernard Cribbs was continued.

Alfred McGinley, city editor of the Standard, testified regarding Cribbs' sobriety and general good conduct.

D. H. McDonald, manager of the Opera House, gave evidence regarding the portions of the building owned and managed by the Opera House and Mr. Dockrill.

He said that the elevator was in the Dockrill section of the building, and that he had no control over it and no responsibility for it. If instructed to make repairs to the elevator by the coroner he could not say that he would carry out the instructions.

Herman Campbell said he was in the Typographical Union rooms on Saturday night. Cribbs was not there. During the evening he heard a noise in the rooms of the Clipper Club in the same building.

Thomas M. Cromwell said that Cribbs had boarded with him for two years. He never knew him to take a drink. The witness was familiar with the stairway in the Opera House and did not consider the hearing was adjourned until Friday evening.

## CLOSING SESSION OF

MISSIONARY INSTITUTE

"The Call of the New China" was the subject of an interesting address by Dr. J. G. Bond, at the closing session of the missionary institute in St. David's church last evening. Geo. A. Henderson was chairman of the meeting and there was a large audience representative of the churches of the city. The opening exercises were conducted by Rev. Miles F. McCutcheon, pastor of Brunswick street church.

Referring to the centuries of China's "splendid isolation" when she refused to receive of other nations, Dr. Bond reminded his hearers that China had a history of centuries, not a fabled history, but a positive one. Two hundred years before Abraham sought the Land of Promise, the Chinese astronomers were recording astronomical observations. They had built great cities, and a perfected civilization. Five hundred years before we knew the art of printing from moving types, the Chinese had it.

This period of splendid isolation no longer existed, however, for China had undergone a revolution which had made her welcome the ingress of western thought.

With the realization of the necessity of keeping pace with the advance spirit of the west, which realization the speaker attributed to the Bible, and a book by a Chinese on "China's only hope," reforms sprang up, and the last decade in the history of China marked one of the greatest periods in the world's history. In 1900 200 Christian missionaries were put to death. In 1912 the first provisional president of the new-born Chinese republic was a Christian.

Picture scenes of scenes in China were given during the evening with explanatory remarks by Rev. H. C. Priest. In the afternoon addresses were given by Mr. Priest and Rev. M. E. Fletcher.
