SOME THINGS WORTH KNOWING. The juice of raw onions applied to the Turpentine, given in teaspoonful doses every eight hours in milk or coffee, is pro-nounced a cure for diphtheria.

A little borax put in water in which scarlet napkins and red bordered towels are to be washed will prevent them from fading. Chloral hydrate, one drachm; glycerine, four drachms; bay rum, eight ounces, will destroy dandruff. Mix and rub on the scalp. Oil of cinnamon, dropped on warts three or four times a day, will cause their disappearance, however hard, large or dense they may be. The application gives no pain, nor loes it cause suppuration.

The white of an egg is stated to be the best application for soothing burns and scalds. It may be poured over the wound, and forms at once a varnish, which excludes the air. It is also far more cooling than the usual application of sweet oil and cotton. Oil of peppermint in water diluted even to one part in 1,000,000 will kill cockroaches in an hour, they dying in convulsions. One

drop of the oil placed under a bell jar covering a cultivation of cholera bacilli will kill both bacilli and spores in forty-eight hours. It is a common occurrence for children to get beans, grains of corn and other foreign substances up their noses. This simple ren edy is worth remembering: Get the child to open its mouth, apply your mouth overit and blow hard. The offending substance will be expelled from its mouth.
