RESTURED TO EMPRESS

Lawsuit in Eugenic's Favor. PARIS, May 25.—An interesting suit has just been decided by the First Civ-1 Tribunal of the Seine, by which the ex-Empress Eugenie has obtained the

restitution of a number of historical articles which belonged to Napoleon I. and to her husband. In giving judgment the court after admitting that the claim was well founded, made the somewhat curious confession, that as the objects had been the private property of the imperial family, and were no longer interesting from an historical point of view, they should be restored to the claimant. They onsist chiefly of articles of bronze of

valuable vases, statues, art furntiure, pictures and tapestries. Some are at Frontainbieau, others at the Elysee, Compeigne, Rambouillet, Verailles and Among the articles which will now pass into the hands of the ex-empress are a book given to the first Napoleon by the pope, the hilt of a sword of ho-nor offered to the conqueror on his re-turn from Egypt. A collection of uni-forms, saddlery, pistols and swords, captured at the battle of the Pyramids, captured at the battle of the Pyramids, a state sword of Napoleon I. the brille bit he used at Waterloo, his famous gray overcoat and famous hat, the tricolor cockade which he wore in his hat when he bade adieu to the Imperial Guard at Frontainebleu, the little wooden bench on which he often sat in his garden at St. Helena and the cord of the Order of the Holy Ghost worn by Louis XVI.
