Milk Fund Saves 5,000 Chicago Babies

Garment Workers' Strike Imposes Terrible Hardship on Innocent Infants.

Mrs. Bowen Heads Wealthy Women in Distributing Life-Giving Milk to Infants.

Chicago, Ill., Dec. 5.—In the war between the 50,000 garment workers and their employers, which has now been in progress 8 weeks, there are involved 7,500 "noncombatants" who have been in a fair way to suffer more than anybody else in the struggle.

Never were there more "innocent" bystanders than these. They don't know anything at all about strikes. Unionism and capitalism are subjects as foreign to them as the far side of the moon. All they know about this labor war is that it is what Gen. Sherman said war was. They can only wonder why, dumbly or nescily, according to whether they are technically "good" babies or "bad."

For the 7,500 babies involved in the garment workers' strike have been in imminent danger of death by starvation. Now, however, thanks to the efforts of Mrs. Joseph T. Bowen and others, that danger has been in a measure averted. A fund has been raised, the milk companies have co-operated with the relief committee, and every baby involved in the strike gets fresh milk every day.

The fund has drawn support from people of every walk of life. People who have no sympathy with unionism and strikes, are free in their contributions for the 7,500 little "noncombatants" as they have been called by Mrs. Bowen, the wealthy society woman who is helping the garment workers in their battle for better conditions. The so-called "capitalist" press, never overfriendly to the unions, has given liberal space to boost the milk fund.

This is the way the situation was set forth in an editorial in the Record-Herald: "Investigators who have visited the homes of the striking garment workers report thousands of babies are in danger of starvation. 'A new slaughter of the innocents' is impending. In civilized warfare, as Mrs. Bowen points out, noncombatants are protected."

"What is more innocently non-combatant than a baby?" "All these babies need milk. The women mentioned, with others, have started a babies milk fund to meet the distressing situation."

"The merits or demerits of the strike are not involved. 'It is an essential and fundamental humanity which is concerned and which should prompt your aid.' Two thousands dollars was contributed the day after the appeal was made, and on the following morning every mother among the strikers who had a child in arms, was given a quart of fresh milk."

Mrs. Joseph T. Bowen, ardent champion of the strikers, is a woman of immense wealth. They say that she could meet the payroll of the 40,000 strikers every week and hardly feel the strain. Yet her sympathies are all with the workers.

"It must be the universal chord of sympathy that is in most breasts," she says, "I feel for the strikers who are facing a dreary winter. To think of them as possibly cold and hungry is something that stirs me—I understand that the issue is more working conditions than salary. But no matter what the strikers get, it is little enough from what I hear."

So she started the milk fund with a cheque for \$1,000 and bustled herself with its administration.
