

WOULD PUT LIGHTS ON BUGGIES.

"While you're talking about Blue Laws, and the Excise, and other forms of Canadian legislation that seem strange to our neighbors across the border," says G. M. The driver of the horse just naturally took it for granted that motorists must observe every traffic regulation, while placing no responsibility on his own rig.'"

"Buggies and all horse-drawn vehicles should carry head and tail lights the same as automobiles do," was the sage remark from the western Ford dealer.

ALLAN AND BALEY FOR THE BELT

Calgary, April 27.—Billy Allen does not seem to take much notice of the threat that Tom Flanagan made recently to the effect that he would take action against Allen if he fought Bayley for the Flanagan belt. He has said nothing about the matter to anyone, but has started training at Ottawa, and whether the belt is at stake or not, he will meet Bayley, and the result of the contest will decide the championship of Canada in the light weight class.

To westerners the whole matter looks like as though the Sporting Club of Toronto wanted to hold a bout for a larger gate than would be possible in a regular boxing ring. This is a ridiculous thing to demand in boxing, for bouts for championships cannot be confined to one place exclusively. Promoters do not care to go to Toronto when they can find a place more suitable for the contest, and where a larger gate can be secured. Besides, certain boxers do not care to do all the travelling, and a man who lives at the west end of the city is much fairer to both boxers to divide the distance and both bear part of the expense.

Allen has notified Tommy Burns that he will come to Bassano about the first of June to train. Bayley will also come about that time and get in his finishing touches. The interest in the bout is the highest, and one of the largest crowds that ever attended a boxing contest in the west is expected to attend the bout on June 29th.

CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR PROTESTING

New York, April 27.—"Tommy" Ryan yesterday wired "Jack" Curley at Hot Springs, Ark. that he is ready to take hold of "Jim" Flynn's training.

An appeal to Christian Endeavor leaders in every State in the Union to protest against the enactment of legislation in New Mexico which would permit the Johnson-Flynn fight to be held in Las Vegas on July 4 was sent out yesterday from the headquarters of the United Society of Christian Endeavor in Boston by the general secretary, William Shaw. A bill legalizing prize fighting has passed the House and is now before the Senate in that State. Ottawa, Ont., April 27.—The Capitals are now in the field trying to sign up players for the coming season. They are sure to experience a great deal of difficulty in getting good men. Several of their best players will likely sign up with the new lacrosse league. Several men have already signed.

This includes St. Thomas, goalkeeper of the Cornwall Intermediates, who is now in town, and thus practically secured Shea and Lavell. Both of these last-named players have other offers, but prefer to remain in Ottawa. Bobby Pringle received an offer of \$1,300, from George Kennedy, and will go to Montreal providing he can get leave of absence.

TWO AND FOUR MILE RELAY CHAMPIONS

Philadelphia, April 27.—The two and four mile relay championship of America were captured by the Philadelphia Institution after a hard struggle, and the one mile national championship was won by Syracuse after Reidpath, her fast quarter miler, had extended himself to the limit to beat out Sanders of Illinois. Some of the best quarter mile men in college were in this event. Both Pennsylvania's victories were also hard won, her runners having to extend themselves right up to the lap McGill University scratched its team in the mile.

A hard rain fell during the afternoon and the track in many places was half an inch deep with water. Despite this condition the Mercersburg (Pennsylvania) Academy broke the world's scholastic one mile relay record in winning the American preparatory school championship. The new time for "prep" schools is 3:27.15, against the former record of 3:30.15.

While the west did not fare very well in the relay races, the athletes from over the Allegheny's showed up well in the field events, and in the 120 yards hurdles. In the hurdle race Nicholson of Missouri University won in the good time of 15.45 seconds, considering the condition of the track. Philbrook of Notre Dame, won both discus and shot putting without much trouble.

A feature of the afternoon was the performance of A. L. Guttersen, of broad jump by leaping 24 feet and 5-8 of an inch from a muddy take off. In none of his tries did he jump under 23 feet. It is probable that he will be a strong contender for a place on the American Olympic team.

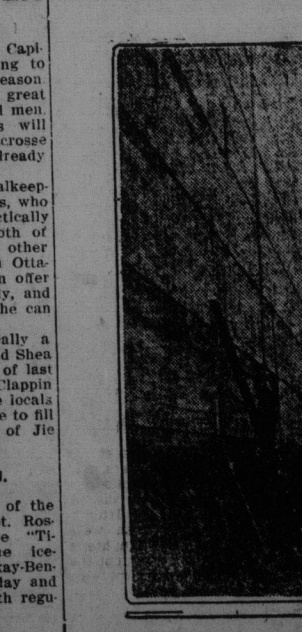
JOE NEPTUNE SIGNS WITH FREDERICTON KILBANE TO FIGHT DUNDEE

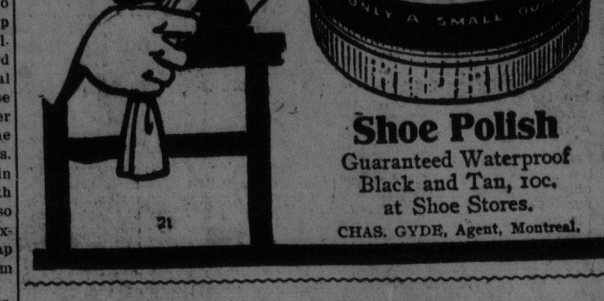

BIG MONEY BET ON DERBY

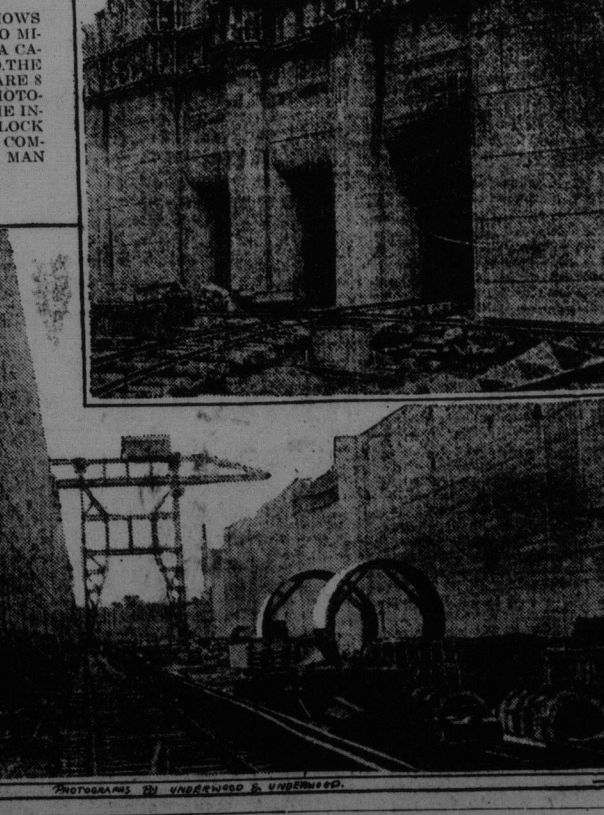
