# CLOSING STOCK LETTER.

By Direct Private Wires to J. C. MacKintosh and Co., St. John, N. B. New York, Jan. 14.—There was no fresh development today of a character to arouse the interest of the stock market and further declines were registered in the active stocks ranging from 1 to 3 points. The latter was taken as evidence of a determination to prosecute the suit already instituted to dissolve the corporation, and that the chances favored a successful issue from the government's viewpoint. The copper stocks responded to rumors that Mr. Lawson and Mr. Wm. Rockefeller would give testimony before the Pujo committee tending to show that a pool in copper metal had existed. The recent decline of the latter was taken as evidence that if such a pool had existed it had been dissolved. The general list reflected better support on a scale down but showed very little rallying power and the prospect at the close favored a further decline before there was a rally of consequence.
