As disclosed also by the affidavits in this case, I have not failed to carefully hotice that among many pensons in Albert county there seems to exist, or to have existed, a good deal of prejudice against the pulsoner quite unsupported by any reliable or accutate knowledge of the ments; and that many of those persons have spoken very foolishly, all of them premburely and inadvisedly. I can understand that; I can make much allowance for it. I know that many described persons in Albert have been grossly deceived and defranded by dishonest commercial tramps who, by their illegal and victous conduct, have unfainly brought suspicion upon the general class or comporation of commercial travelens—a class in itself composed of intelligent, respectable and responsible men. We must not wonder too much, therefore, or judge too severely, to find that in the first disclosure, even ex parte, of a supposed similar outnage people have allowed prejudice to becloud their reason and pervert their feelings into a crude and premature judgment—induced mainly by the man on the street, or the interested partizan—exaggerated from place to place—who knows nothing of, or designedly discolors, the true inwardness of the matter. But on sober second thought, it is always the case with the honest that the premature prejudice gives place to a righteous jealousy for fair play and a determination for an hone of thearing and even-handed justice to any subject a raisoner at the bar.
