A young lad from Moss township was summoned before Police Magistrate D. C. McKenzie last week charged with carrying a revolver or pistols. A writ has since been issued on behalf of Mrs. Brown against Mrs. Stover for \$5,000 damages on the grounds of false arrest and malicious prosecution. The child, it is reported, is being cared for by another sister, living in the township of Moss, near Glencoe, pending the outcome of further litigation.

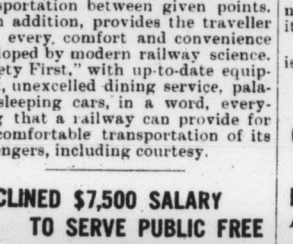

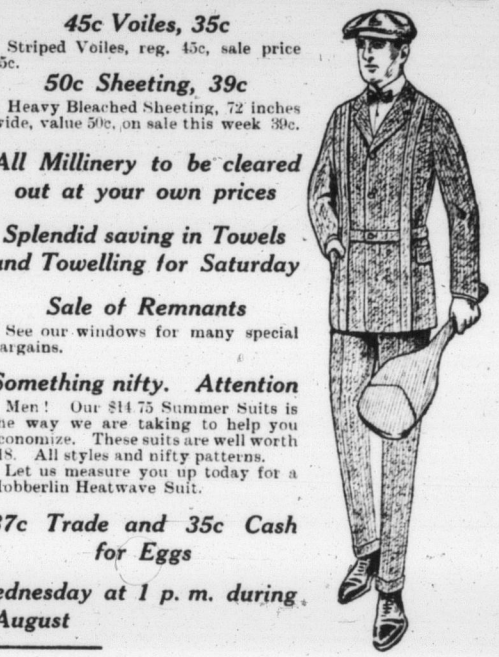
