Kidd's Treasure.

It has been intimated in the ACADIAN more than once that certain parties are interested in the finding of treasures supposed to have been secreted in a cave under Blomidon, and that these parties are on a wild-goose chase—that is after something that will never be overtaken and secured. From the circumstances that they leave home at night when there is no one around to witness their departure, it is inferred that they themselves are dubious of results and fear that they may be held up to ridicule of their fellow citizens. Be this as it may they have such an assurance of possibility if not the probability of ultimate success that they are willing to pay Government an annual sum of money, by which they hold the right of search against all comers. About 60 years ago several persons testified to having seen an opening at the base of the cliff made with stone and arched above. Amongst them was a Captain Sanford, who has seen it more than once. It was described as a narrow passage about 10 feet in length which opened into a spacious room. This cave must have been excavated for a purpose, and what more reasonable than the supposition that it had once been a resort of the famous Captain Kidd, or of some one of his ilk; and that there must be untold treasures stored away to enrich the discoverer. The fortune tellers of the day who were consulted declared that this was the fact. Others of more modern date who have duly consulted the signs from the palm of the hand have described the past exploits of the chief operator, and pointed out the ultimate goal that is yet to be reached beneath the frowning cliff. It is affirmed that the entrance was once found by certain persons, but that the water left by the high tides prevented their entering it. One however managed to get near enough to stick a pole into the earth at the opening, where it remained for some time. Subsequently there was a landslide that partially covered the entrance, and afterward there was another that concealed the whole thing from view. Now what remains is to remove the debris that has accumulated and take possession of the coveted spoil, several of whom are still living, and some who have passed away, have at different times been the subjects of the losing ventures, but it seems that the one has the faith to persevere. We hope he may be rewarded.

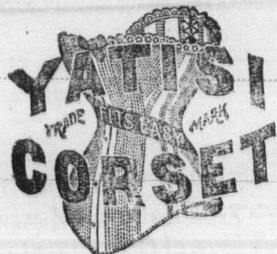
