

Meeting of the House—takes place at 3 p.m., unless otherwise ordered, 7.—The House does not usually sit on Saturday, 12.—See *Quorum*.

Members of the Legislative Assembly—occasionally bring up Messages, 101.—Have reserved seats below the Bar, 103.

Members of the Legislative Council—elect their Speaker, 1. Take the oath, 2.—Keep their places until the Speaker has left the Chair, 14.—Sit uncovered and bow to the Chair when entering or crossing the House, 15.—Can only converse below the Bar, 15.—May desire the galleries to be cleared, 16; or the House to be put in Committee, 89.

——Addressing the House, 17. Offended or injured, 18. Using objectionable words, 19.—See *Debates*.

——May not go down to the Assembly to be examined, nor send their answers, without leave, on pain of being committed, 104.

Messages—Carried by one of the Clerks, 99.—Received without interrupting business, 100.—Sometimes brought up by Members and received by the Speaker at the Bar, 101.—For the attendance of Members, Officers, &c., before the Assembly, 104.

Money Bills—Annexing irrelevant clauses thereto disallowed, 47.—Must be recommended by the Queen's Representative, 48.

Motions—deemed special, require one intermediate day's notice, 31.—No Member can withdraw a motion without the unanimous consent of the House, 31.—No prefaced motion can be received, 32.—Nor can a motion for making a Standing Order be adopted, unless the Members in attendance on the session be summoned, 33.—A motion for printing any paper is first referred to the Printing Committee, 35.—Rules respecting Motions under debate, 36.

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Naming Members—not allowed, 17.
