^{to} \$8,093,886, were for payment in Canada; the remainder, 171,916, amounting to \$2,235,097, were payable abroad. While the domestic business exhibits much the ^{same} results as the previous year, the transactions with other countries continue to increase in volume. The transmissions by Money Order to other countries, in 1887, exceeded those of 1886 by \$150,000, and the payments in Canada of Money Orders originating abroad exceeded like payments in 1886, by \$249,716.

Correspondence is now in progress with a view to the establishment of a direct interchange of Money Orders between Canada and the Leeward Islands, West Indies.
