Sir:

By direction of the Royal Commission on Indian Affairs for British Columbia, I have the honour to transmit herewith for your consideration copy of a letter received from Indian Agent Iver Fougner, which is in general tenor similar to other communications received from various Agents of the Department of Indian Affairs throughout the Province. The "Game Regulations 1914" circular was attached to Mr Fougner's letter.

Referring to the Game Act, I am further directed by the Commission to invite your attention to the fact that by the second proviso of Section 9 Indians are allowed to kill and retain in possession male deer over one year of age.

Section 10 provides that no person shall kill in any one year or season more than four deer.

The Indian is a person under the Act.

The Commissioners would be glad to be advised whether or not you instruct your deputies to limit the privilege of the Indians to killing four deer in any one year or season, as they are of the opinion that it is advisable insofar as possible that their instructions to the Indians and your own should coincide.
