duty ou pulp wood so as to make it practically prohibitive until such time as the United States Government open their market for the finished product to Canadian manufacturers. This is only fair and just, and I cannot see why any hesitation should take place in adopting it. Canada has an opportunity now which should be taken advantage of. If she does not do so quickly, it simply means that she is not only losing an opportunity, but is losing time that cannot be recalled.

I trust, Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, that I have not intruded on your time too long, and that I have not deviated from the subject of my paper too much. Your Association would be many times more valuable to Canada's interests than it is if the development of the forests was done by Canadian manufacturers, and the material taken from your forests manufactured into the finished product in Canada rather than as it is at present.
