Will Lay Brick on Queen St.

Decision Reached by the City Council at Meeting Held Last Evening.

By-Law Against Depositing Refuse in the River—Other Matters Dealt With.

"That whereas this Council on April 20, 1903, passed a resolution to take initiative proceedings to construct a Warren's Bituminous pavement on Queen and Fourth streets, from King St. to the Grand Trunk Railway, and notice was published on April 28th and May 5th, 1903, in the two city dailies of the same; and whereas it is desirable to withdraw such initiative proceedings, and the City Solicitor has advised that the Council may do so providing no by-law has been passed to adopt the Engineer's report and authorizing the work to be proceeded with, and no such by-law has been passed; be it resolved, that the initiative proceedings taken to construct a Warren's Bituminous pavement on Queen and Fourth streets, from King St. to the Grand Trunk Railway, be, and the same are, hereby withdrawn, and the same be considered null and void."

This motion was moved by Ald. Mounter and Piggott, and unanimously carried at the meeting of the Council Board last evening. Ald. Mounter brought the matter up. In doing so he said:

"It is well understood that a large petition for a brick pavement, sufficiently signed, has been received. At the last meeting it was understood that five of the petitioners wished to withdraw their names. It has since been learned that everyone who signed for that pavement is unanimously in favor of brick. We have therefore decided to put down a brick pavement."

He then asked the aldermen for their opinions in the matter, and they were all in accord with the course pursued by the Board of Works.

The above motion was then passed unanimously.

Later on in the evening a by-law was passed to accept the Engineer's report for a brick pavement on Queen street, and the Board of Works were authorized to advertise for tenders for the same.

Every member of the Council, except Ald. Scullard and Robinson, were present at last night's meeting. Ald. Scullard arrived just as the Council adjourned, about nine o'clock, signed a letter asking permission to cut down a tree. Referred to Chief of Police.

H. Randall complained of his dog tax. He has no dog. Referred to Finance.

A letter was read re the surety offered for the asphalt block pavement, and was referred to the Board of Works.

A letter from the Good Roads Association was also referred to the Board of Works.

An opinion was read from the City Solicitor advising that the Council could withdraw the initiative proceedings for a Bituminous pavement and adopt brick.

2. Re the administration of justice account, we recommend that the city's share, \$415.38, be paid.

The report was adopted.

Ald. Mounter reported that the Engineer had decided to drive piles under the two creek bridges to be used as supports for the present timbers. This would make the bridges safe, and would enable next year's Council to figure on new bridges. The work will cost about \$200.

The action was confirmed.

A letter was read from the Ontario Asphalt Block Company, who are taking over the business of the Forest City Paving Company, assuring the Council that they would guarantee their pavement for fifteen years and that they will repair all defects in the pavement in that time. An agreement will be made out in a few days.

Ald. Piggott distributed a little praise to the press for starting a movement against the dumping of refuse into the river. He also brought up the question of the Bell Telephone Franchise. He thought this matter should be dealt with before the last minute.

Ald. Martin was in sympathy with Mr. Piggott there, and Ald. Marshall, of the Finance Committee, reported that they are looking into the matter.

The Mayor stated that there was a by-law against the throwing of refuse into the river, and that the Police should see that it is enforced.

Two by-laws were then read and passed. One was for a glazed pipe sewer on Murray St., and the other was for the brick pavement on Queen street.
