BOTHWELL

Is an incorporated Town, in the township of Zone, in the ex-
treme northeast corner of the county, on the line of the
Great Western Railway, 23 miles from Chatham. The place
was first started about the year 1858, and Bothwell proba-
bly owes its existence to the discovery of oil in the vicinity
about that time. It was for some years thereafter the seat
of quite an extensive oil business, and grew rapidly. In the
year 1867 a disastrous conflagration destroyed the greater
portion of the town, and this, together with the general de-
pression of the oil business, gave the place a serious set back.
It is surrounded by a good farming county, from which it
derives a profitable trade and is increasing steadily, if not
rapidly, in population and business, and bids fair to regain
eventually its old time prosperity. It has a flour mill, a saw
