GROWING.

The amount received on the Bishop's Fund (quarterly 25c. envelopes) during the first quarter of this year exceeded that of last year by about 25 per cent. Nevertheless it still represents only a small part, about one-fifth, of the very smallest amount which might reasonably be expected from the members of the Church in this Diocese. The increase is gratifying and warrants us in looking forward to a time when this fund will reach such proportions as will enable substantial payments to be made on the debt in each year.

THE A.Y. P. A. MEETINGS on Monday evenings in the School House have been well patronized all through the winter. Every evening since its organization an interesting programme has been provided, consisting of Debates, Pistorical Sketches, Lantern Lectures, Social Evenings and Musical Entertainment. During the season of Lent the subjects have been of a devotional and instructive character, such as the study of certain Bible heroines, Missionary Sketch of Church life in Japan, a paper on Confirmation, History of Missions in India, etc.

On Monday, March 6th, under the auspices of the A. Y. P. A., Dr. Parks of Toronto University, gave a very interesting Lantern Lecture in the Cathedral Crypt which was well attended. The subject, "Ontario's Northlands," was handled by the lecturer in a masterly way and proved most instructive. A large number of choice slides from special photographs were shown during the evening.

Wednesday evening, March 15th, the Aitar Guild met in the Library after Evensong. Canon Macnab as chairman gave an address of instruction as to the duties and responsibilities of those belonging to the Guild, and provided them with a Card of Membership. A number of new members were present and received instructions for their work.

MEMORIAL FLOWERS.—Several members of the Congregation have requested for themselves the privilege of supplying annually on certain dates the flowers for the Altar in memory of some dearly loved one. We heartily commend this form of memorial as being most fitting and appropriate. It has also been suggested that the name and date of such commemoration should be mentioned in the Monthly Notes, but this requires further consideration.

We are glad to note that the Lenten daily Services in the Chapel, and the Wednesday evening Services in the Cathedral have been attended by larger congregations this season than in any previous year. A new "Help yourself" shelf has been placed on the wal! 'n the Corridor of the Cathedral for the use of the Congregation. There will be found there, Copies of the Lenten Leaflet, Envelopes for the Bishop's Quarterly Fund, Special Offertory Envelopes and other matter for distribution amongst the worshippers. Help yourself.

In the Sunday School one hundred and eighty Lenten Self-denial boxes have been appropriated by the children and their teachers for their Missionary offerings. These boxes will be brought in on Easter Sunday afternoon at the Children's Service. We expect great results from the children's enthusiasm in regard to the Church's Mission work amongst the Indians.
