Portsmouth, June 12.

Three slave vessels, she had captured, were condemned by her. One of these prizes is 96 feet long, and 261 tons burthen. She is to be sent to England under the name of "The Black Beauty, of Southampton." The Edward has brought home the master and mate of the ship Malta of Liverpool, for trial on a charge of slaving.

The Board of Admiralty have determined on fitting out a northern expedition to the Arctic Seas. Its object appears to be to explore the Eastern shores of the island of Spitz-Captain Parry has been bergen. selected for this interesting survey, and the Hecla is to be prepared for the service. Captain Parry and a party of the Hecla's officers are to leave the Hecla in the neighborhood of Spitzbergen and with boats and vessels of a peculiar construction, attempt to reach the North Pole.
