

To which His Excellency was pleased to make the following Answer :

GENTLEMEN,

IT affords me great Pleasure and Satisfaction, that you so readily concur with me in Sentiment regarding the Provincial Funds, and the adopting some Method of guarding against future Dearth of Grain, Objects worthy of your most serious Attention; and I am happy if my Endeavours in improving the Roads, shall add to the future Prosperity of the Inhabitants of this Province.

Then the House adjourn'd till Tomorrow Morning Eleven o'Clock.
