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TO SAFEGUARD THREE ALLIES

Says France Should Protect Britain, and Belgium and Italy as Well

AS TO REPARATIONS

Wiesbaden Post, British Delegate Holds, to be Prejudicial and a Mistake

LONDON, Nov. 9.—An official paper which has been issued, detailing the terms and the effect of the Wiesbaden agreement signed October 6, by M. Louchet, the French Minister of Liberated Regions, and Dr. Walter Rathenau, German Minister of Reconstruction, includes an important report by the British delegate on the Reparations Commission, Sir John Bradbury, expressing surprise that Germany has voluntarily undertaken these additional burdens, which, he declares, can hardly be borne without prejudice to Germany's other treaty obligations.

He argues that they constitute alterations of the treaty in favor of France, to the detriment of the other allies. He therefore proposes in behalf of Great Britain, Belgium and Italy, certain safeguards, the principal one being that France should pay to the general reparations account any amounts necessary to insure that the other allies shall receive their proper amounts from Germany, and that the deferred debt to Germany should never be allowed to exceed four billion gold marks.

CANADA'S AGED V. C. OFF TO BIG CEREMONY U. S. President Details Guard of Regular Soldiers to Accompany the Canadians

TORONTO, Nov. 9.—Sergt. Geo. Richardson, Canada's nonagenarian V.C., accompanied by Sergt. Walter L. Rayfield, V.C., First Vice-President of the Grand Army of United Veterans, left last night en route to Washington, D.C., to place upon the tomb of America's "unknown hero," on behalf of the veterans of Canada, a wreath of maples donated by Mrs. Percy Walters of this city. The ceremony will be observed in Arlington Cemetery on Armistice Day. The aged warrior was in fine spirits, and was greatly touched by the presence of many friends who were at the station to bid him Godspeed.

Prof. Losey Declares Led Taken to the Border by Force and Slay

BRIDGEBURG, Nov. 9.—That Kenneth Losey, the young lad whose body was found in the Niagara River, near the International Bridge a week ago, came to his death at the hands of rum-runners, and that he did not commit suicide, is the declaration of the lad's father, Prof. M. D. Losey, of Meriden, Conn.

"From the character of the neighborhood near International bridge, between Bridgeburg and Buffalo, where the body of my 18-year-old son was found, his murder might have been committed by a bootlegging gang," said the anguished parent today.

"The International Bridge police told me that the section where the body was found is infested with bootleggers, who are known to have brought innocent young men from other parts of the country to assist them in smuggling liquor across the border. I maintain that my son was in New York City, and was brought to the border by force. He may have refused to do their dirty work and his life was the price of his refusal," declared Prof. Losey today.

WOUNDED VETERAN WON FIVE MILE WALK

TORONTO, Nov. 9.—R. W. Munn, a veteran of the Great War, won the five mile handicap walk at the West End Y.M.C.A. yesterday. Munn, who was wounded in the war, walked with a decided limp, was placed on the limit mark with 20 minutes on the scratch men, Charles Barnes, who won the Ontario championship at the recent A.A.U. of T. meet at Belleville. Munn's long handicap just enabled him to win out by about ten yards from C. M. J. Delahanty, a 12-minute man.

Barnes walked the distance in 38 minutes and 43 seconds.
