**LOBSTERS IN
NOVA SCOTIA**

Coves at Canso Yield This Delicacy Even to Amateur Fishermen.

It is estimated that the annual catch of lobsters in the world is 125,000,000, and of this Nova Scotia supplies 40,000,000, valued at \$2,000,000.

The lobster pack, that comes from anywhere else than this part of Canada is almost negligible. The lobster fishing has been well maintained of late, thanks to the help of the lobster hatcheries, which are placing in the sea millions of small lobsters yearly.

It is still possible at Canso, Nova Scotia, as it is at but few places in the world, for an amateur to watch the lobsters crawling on bottoms of sheltered coves, and fishing them up, carry them home for supper, confident that they will have fresh boiled lobsters.

Nova Scotia has almost complete monopoly of the English trade in the supplying of canned lobsters.
