ITALIAN KILLED IN FERNIE MINE

TWO LOADED CARS BREAK AWAY AND CRUSH WORKMAN

FERNIE, B.C., May 20.—An accident occurred in No. 5, Mine Michel today, which resulted fatally for Ernest Delucca, an Italian. Delucca was employed as a rope rider on the main slope, and was standing at the bottom of the incline making up his trip, when two cars loaded with timber broke away from the hoist and struck him. The unfortunate man was carried to the hospital, where he died in a very short time. He was a young man, and leaves no family or relatives in this country.

BOTH EYES BLOWN OUT

G.T.E. Employee Badly Injured While Catching Fish With Dynamite

OTTAWA, May 20.—Isaac Watson, an employee of the Grand Trunk railway had both his eyes blown out and one of his arms shattered by the premature explosion of a stick of dynamite which it is reported, he was about to place in the Madawaska River near Renfrew yesterday, with the object of stunning fish and then capturing them. The injured man was brought to the Renfrew hospital. He belongs to Casselman, near Ottawa.

NEW EXCHANGE AT QU'APPELLE

WILL NOT RECEDE Government No Intention of Altering New Postal Act

OTTAWA, May 16.—"I have no intention of receding from the position I have taken in connection with the postal convention between Canada and the United States," said Hon. Rudolph Lemieux today. "From a business point of view, we were altogether too long carrying United States mail for almost nothing. There is no sense in us doing that again. I looked carefully into the matter before going ahead and do not intend to recede."

ALLEGED GRAIN SWINDLE

Alleged Perpetrator of Clever Fraud Held On \$8,000 Bail

WINNIPEG, May 19.—F. A. Nugget was arrested Saturday morning at Stanford, about 20 miles from Winnipeg, and brought to town on charges of being responsible for the attempted swindle of several Winnipeg grain firms. Nugget was taken before Provincial Magistrate McKelvey and remanded for a week, \$8,000 bail being demanded. The police are on the track of an accomplice who is likely to be arrested soon.

adopted. Acting Mayor Thomson held that the two conflicted.

Ald. Cowan claimed that there was no time for a delegation to go to eastern cities and report intelligently on bases before June 7th, on which day the money by-law for street improvements was to be voted on.

Ald. Wilkinson's Experience

Ald. Wilkinson informed the council that while in Ottawa recently he had studied the pavement question and had visited the pavements around Parliament buildings and in his opinion it was one of the poorest pieces of paving work that he had ever come across. A post card received by him, and he believed other members of the council had received similar communications, informed him that the same pavement was laid upon a bituminous base. He had voted for the sending away of a delegation, but he would have to be shown better reasons before he would support a bituminous base.

On the understanding that the matter would be brought up for further consideration before June 7th, Ald. McDonald agreed to let his notice of motion stand over.

On the motion of Ald. Gillespie, Ald. Wright and the city engineer were appointed as the delegates.

Extend Scope of Inquiry

Ald. Peverett said if they were going to the expense of sending a delegation away, they might as well get something for their money, he therefore moved the following motion with a view to the delegation reporting on pavements generally.

"That the committee, consisting of Ald. Wright and the city engineer also report on all kinds of pavements coming under their observation, and to report as to the known durability and satisfaction each is giving the several municipalities visited by them."

The motion carried.

A Delicate Question

The other clause of the works committee also came in for some criticism. The clause being as follows: "That they have examined the tenders for sewer pipe along with the city engineer and after consideration resolved to recommend that the tender of the Macomb Sewer Pipe Co. be accepted for the six in., 8 in., and 12 in. sewer pipe for the year's supply, to be shipped as required."

Why, Ald. McDonald wanted to know, was the Macomb tender accepted in view of the fact that it was not the lowest? Ald. Gillespie said that the city had been using the Macomb pipe for two years and found it in every way satisfactory. On six inch pipe the Macomb tender was the lowest.

MUST PROTECT CITY'S INTEREST

Mayor Ashdown Says Agreement With C.N.E. Must Wait for Bylaw

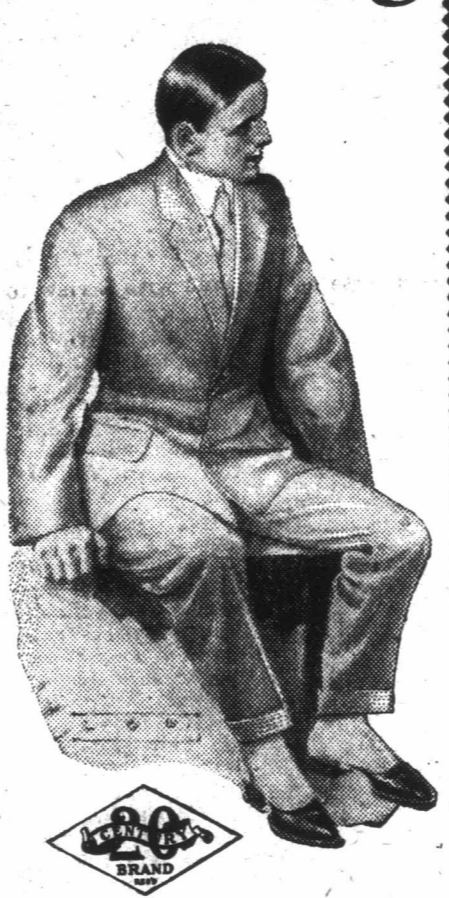
WINNIPEG, May 21.—Mayor Ashdown stated today that the Board of Control has been advised that the agreement with the C. N. E. in regard to the closing of streets and lanes in Fort Rouge to give yard accommodation and site for the company's shops, cannot be considered binding until the by-law satisfying the agreement has been passed by the council. This by-law has not yet passed and according to the mayor, it is not probable that it will be passed until definite and sufficient arrangements have been made with the C. N. E. and also the C. P. R. to protect the interests of the city.
