London, Jan. 10. - There was a singular dearth of news this morning from all parts of the theater of war, Gen. all parts of the theater of war, Gen. French supplements his advices of yesterday by reporting that Capt. Ricardo and four troopers of the Life Guards are missing, showing that his reconnoitering party met with opposition. General Gatacre despatched a strong force Monday, Jan. 8, to reconnoiter Stormberg, which the Boers were reported to have evacuated. The British found the burghers stronglhy entrenched and returned to Sterkstroom. The Saidors and Firemen's union of Glasgow is trying to block the sailing of the transport City of Rome, by demanding an increase of wages.

THE NATION ANGRY. London, Jan. 10.—The plight shadowed for the present by the storm which is bursting over the head of the home government. The Manchester speeches of Mr. Balfour, the government ment leader in the house of commons, have loosened such a torrent of comment from the press and individuals of his own party that were parliament to reassemble to-day it is doubtful if the Conservatives would retain power is evite of their tremendous majority the Conservatives would retain power in spite of their tremendous majority of the past session. The pent-up dissatisfaction with the government's lack of energy in waging the war is no longer concealed. When such ardent Conservative papers as the Times and Globe come out boldly with reproof, there is no knowing where the agitation will end. The provincial press has already taken up the cry. For the moment Mr. Balfour is the scapegoat, but there is a terrible rod in pickle for the Marquis of Lansdowne, while Lord Salisbury and other cabinet ministers will not escape unless a wonderful change comes over the war situation.

WHAT IS BULLER DOING?

New York Jan. 10.—A despatch to the Tribune from London says: If the complete embargo on news be one of the conditions of successful strategy something really Napoleonic must be going on along the Tugela river. At the clubs nearly all well-informed men were confident that the army had been set in motion on Monday, and officers lingered at the military service till midnight, in expectation of receiving tidings of some great stroke.

Gen. Buller's delay in regarding in front of his force seemed fan insuperable objection to the first theory and there were only two facts to be cited in support of the latter conjectures. These were the establishment of Warren's headquarters as far down as Estcourt, and the apparent occupation of Weenen by British far down as Estcourt, and the apparent occupation of Weenen by British troops, since one press despatch which slipped through the censor's hands described an exchange of flashlight signals with the village.
