### BOERS AS BRITISH SUBJECTS.

Over ten thousand Boers and Cape Colony rebels have surrendered and given up their arms since peace was declared in South Africa, and it is said that some two thousand have not yet come in. The conduct of the burghers who have surrendered up to date seems to indicate a willingness to submit to the inevitable that was scarcely expected. Instead of being silent and taciturn over defeat, they admit it cheerfully and are apparently sincere in their expressions of loyalty.

A significant feature of the whole, some contempt of the burghers for the French and German officers who fought with them, and their anger against these officers for advising them to continue fighting, in the hope of European intervention. Some even go so far as to express willingness to fight with Germany against Britain.

It certainly looks as though firm and kindly treatment now is all that is needed to make the South African burghers good British subjects.

### SOMEWHAT AT SEA.

It is very hard to please the Tory organs in this recent business. In the North Grey case, the judge found that four ballots given to Mr. Carscallen, the Conservative candidate, bore a light cross for Mr. McKay also. The returning officer, in a spirit of utter fairness, counted these for Mr. Carscallen, yet the papers howl about corruption and make the silly statement that these ballots were doctored after being counted. —Banner.

But, leaving aside its clumsy blunder in declaring Mr. Carscallen the Conservative candidate in North Grey, this great hope journal merely desires to focus its attention upon the fact that it was his honor Judge Morrison, before whom the Liberals themselves sought the recount, who summed up with the "silly statement" that he was "clearly of the opinion that these ballots had been tampered with since they were counted on election night, and would allow them for Mr. Boyd, the Conservative candidate, if persuaded he had jurisdiction in the matter."

### THE ARMY MULE.

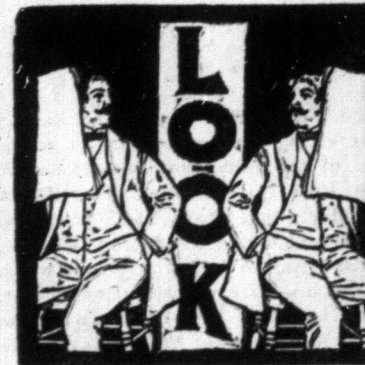

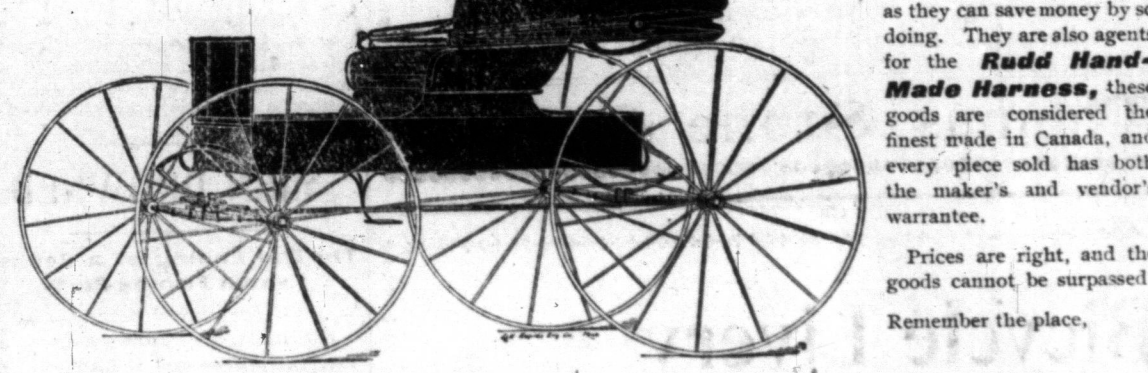
