DEAN OF KINGS IS DEAD

Christian IX. of Denmark, Born
April 8, 1818, Crosses the Bar.

Death Came as a Great Shock to His
Beloved Daughter, Queen Alexandra,
to the Courts of Europe and to His
People, to Whom He Was Beloved
By Reason of His Democratic Man-
ners—Frederick VIII. to Be Pro-
claimed King To-day.

Copenhagen, Jan. 30.—Christian the
Ninth, the aged King of Denmark,
death of the crowned heads of Europe,
father of King George of Greece, of
Queen Alexandra of Great Britain and
Ireland and of the Dowager Empress
Maria Feodorovna of Russia, grand-
father of King Haakon the Seventh of
Norway and related by blood or by
marriage to most of the European rulers,
died with startling suddenness in the
Amalienborg Palace yesterday after-
noon. The accession of his successor,
Prince Frederick, his eldest son,
who will be known as Frederick the
Eighth, will be proclaimed to-day.

The following official bulletin was
issued last night.
"His Majesty died at 3.30 o'clock this
afternoon. After his majesty had
brought this morning's audience to a
conclusion he appeared to be quite
well and proceeded to luncheon as
usual. Toward the end of the meal
he gave evidence of indisposition and
was compelled to retire to bed at 2.30
p.m. His majesty passed away peace-
fully, the symptoms indicating heart
failure."

A Great Shock.
The death of King Christian has
plunged half the courts of Europe into
the deepest mourning and brought a
sense of personal as well as of sincere
grief to everyone throughout the king-
dom of Denmark, reaching even to the
humblest cottage.

Every flag in the city is at half-mast,
all the places of amusement are closed,
and the people walk the streets as
though they were passing through the
chamber of death itself.

Yesterday afternoon, when the flag
over the palace was placed at half-
mast, the news spread rapidly. It was
not believed by the great crowds
which gradually assembled in the
square in front of Amalienborg Palace,
but when uncertainty gave place to
certainty those in the assemblage shed
tears and dispersed in respectful sil-
ence.

World-Wide Condolence.
Telegrams of condolence
were pouring in last night in-
cluding messages from all the sover-
eigns of Europe and the Danish colonies.

Premier Christensen last night ten-
dered his resignation of his cabinet
the new king, who expressed a wish
that the present Ministry should con-
tinue to carry on the affairs of the
Government.

Both Houses of Parliament will as-
semble to-day, when the respective
presidents will formally announce the
death of King Christian.

At 3 p.m. the members will assem-
ble in the hall of the Folketing to
receive the royal message announcing
the accession of Frederick the Eighth.
Public announcements of the death of
King Christian and the accession of
King Frederick will be made at noon
from a balcony of the Amalienborg
Palace.

Great Shock to Queen Alexandra.
London, Jan. 30.—It is estimated that
a memorial service in honor of the late
King Christian will be held in the chap-
el royal, St. James' Palace, simultane-
ously with the funeral services held
in Denmark.

Queen Alexandra received the news
of the death of her father-in-law.
It came as a great shock to her, as ap-
parently there had been no previous
intimation of any indisposition.

BELOVED BY HIS PEOPLE.
Sketch of a King Noted For His
Democratic Manners.

Christian IX., King of Denmark, was
born April 8, 1818, and succeeded to
the throne on Nov. 15, 1862.
Prince Frederick, his eldest son and
heir to the throne, was born June 3,
1843.

The late king's eldest daughter is
Queen Alexandra of England, and his
second son, Prince William, was elect-
ed King of Greece, under the title of
George I. in 1863.

Another daughter, Marie Dagmar, is
the Dowager Empress of Russia, mo-
ther of the present Czar.
Princess Thyra, the third daughter,
is Duchess of Cumberland, whose hus-
band claims the throne of Hanover.

The queen died Sept. 29, 1898, and
since her death King Christian has
never seemed to recover his former
happy manner.

ever popular in Britain, and it is often
hinted that Denmark's safety of late
years from German aggression was due
largely to the fact that the British
people would not tolerate any attack
on the land of their Queen's birth.

THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.
Rumblings Against Balfour as Party
Leader—Unionists Now Being Divi-
ded Into Three Classes.

London, Jan. 30.—(C. A. P.)—Rum-
blings against the continuation of Mr.
Balfour in the Conservative leadership
increase. The Standard publishes an-
other column of letters from prominent
party men, predicting only disaster to
the party if his leadership continues.
They affirm that Mr. Chamberlain, as
the Prime Minister, has having sympathy
with Canada and the other Colonies,
is the only man to restore the party to
fortune.

The Unionist members are being di-
vided into three classes—109 Tariff
Reformers; 32 Balfourites; 11 Free
Traders.

Will to Oppose Balfour.
At a meeting of the Conservative
Association of the City of London yester-
day the resignation of A. G. Gibbs,
member of Parliament for the City of
London, was accepted, and the candi-
dature of Arthur J. Balfour for that
constituency was approved. The Lib-
eral Association of the City of London
also met yesterday and postponed until
Friday its decision whether to oppose
the former Premier. Several Liberals
expressed willingness to contest the seat.
