DEAR EDITOR,—In a special cable just received from London it is stated that the statements which have been made by certain parties in relation to the Canadian forces, etc., it is learned, likely to be challenged by the Military authorities and the Canadian Y. M. C. A. workers, and certain people may be called upon to substantiate such statements.

It would appear to the writer as most unfortunate that in these times such extravagant statements should be publicly made. They have a tendency to make unhappy the parents and relatives of those overseas, and they have a most appalling effect upon recruiting.

In their anxiety to make a point against our federal government they do not stop to be informed. As a matter of fact the Canadian forces overseas are entirely under the control of the Imperial government. We can't even be prohibited in Canada by order of the Minister of Militia, whereas in England and France these same forces come under the Imperial regulations and those of our Canadian clergyman who have been with the overseas forces proclaim the care taken of our boys as excellent.

As to the 'social vices' one would be ten times as free from temptations there as in any of our larger cities in Canada, Montreal, for instance.

We would earnestly urge that these elderly maiden sisters and those highly paid but most inconsiderate and unmindful clergymen who find eager audiences to hear their untrue and startling statements, try to hold themselves in check for a few weeks. The Imperial government is comprised of God fearing and wise men who are doing the best they can under most embarrassing conditions.

A few addresses upon the pure gospel as taught by the fathers, unimpeached by congressional and untrue statements, would be a treat in these times of worry and heartache.
