MISSING BOY'S BODY FOUND AT WATERVILLE

The body of the little eleven years old Vidito boy, who disappeared from his home at Berwick on Wednesday, Sept. 9th, was discovered in the Cornwallis river at Waterville on Friday last. A man who was repairing a fence saw what he thought was a human arm protruding from the water and wading out recovered the body. It will be remembered that the lad told his brother that he would drown himself rather than go to school and he evidently kept his word. A coroner's jury brought in a verdict of suicide by drowning. The incident is a particularly sad one and has made a deep impression upon the people of the community.
