The New Brunswick election with its remarkable result, was fought in the main on local issues but in two respects it properly engages the attention of the people of Canada at large.

The Opposition, which was vir tually non-existent in the late house, with only two members in the Legislature, increasing to three after the last session, challenged the seemingly strongly entrenched government on moral issues, and clean government, which is a matter of Dominionwide concern.

When J. K. Fleming was driven his ability to take the longer view by the force of public opinion from the premiership some three years ago as the outcome of revelations of the political corrupti n brought out by an investagation which his own government had been forced to institute, it was a clear intimation to Conservatives of New Brunswick to clean house.

New Brunswick politics have of late left much to be desired Mr. Fleming's weaknesses were held by his political associates to lean to virtue's side. The tolltaking enterprise which was brought home to him had been done for the furthering of the party fortunes, and had thus been sanctified. While, therefore, they thought it wise to secure his retirement from his official position, they still regarded him as entitled to their allegiance. Mr. Fleming transferred himself to the Dominion field and became the Conservarive candidate for the Dominion House in Carleton-Victoria in opposition to F. B. Carvell, no doubt with the approval of Sir Robert Borden. He has in fact never ceased to be to the actual leader of the Conservative provincial party, and in the late election he took the platform as its most redoubtable champion.
