They point to the sympathetic rise in the tide of realth of the community as a proo

of the soundness of their doctrine The cheap years of '76, '77 '78 and '79 did not give prosperity to Canada. Which class is right? Are high prices or low prices the more conducive to a people's industria growth? Do the prices of labor and a factor into the equation of growth If one class of merchandize is ab normally high, the manufacturers of it may make large profits, but the people pay these profits and the untry is no richer. On the other hand, if another class of merchandize is abnormally cheap-is sold a a loss, the consumer gains, but the manufacturer loses, and the country e a whole is none the richer.

Can it, therefore, be said that either high or low prices have any thing whatever to do with a people's prosperity? Wealth is created only Labor is the only basis of nat onal prosperity. The more the labor of the country is employed -other things being equal-the more it progresses in the scale of national growth. The N, P. promises not to be a blessing because it enhances values or prices, but because it promises to employ labor, to give a home market for the bandiwork of our people.
