When Napoleon I was crowned King of Italy at Milan in 1805, he placed the iron crown of the Kings of Lombardy upon his head with his own hands, exclaiming, "Dieu me l'a donne, gare a qui la touche" ("God has given it to me, beware who touch-es"). This, according to Scott, was the motto attached to the crown by its ancient owners. The crown takes its name from the narrow iron band within it, which is about three-eighths of an inch broad and one-tenth of an inch in thickness. Tradition says that it was made out of one of the nails used at the crucifixion, and given to Constantine by his mo-ther, Helena, the discoverer of the cross, to protect him in battle. After-wards it was used in the coronations of the Lombard kings—primarily at that of Acilulfus at Milan, in the year
