TO THE PRESIDENT AND COMMITTEE OF THE ROYAL AGRICULTURAL SOCIETY.

For the information of the Committee of the Royal Agricultural Society, I beg leave to state that the Secretary of the Society delivered me the Report of the Judges for Fat Cattle, exactly as it was written by them, to be conveyed by me to the Printing Office. In the Rending Room of the Islander Office I observed, that the Ox exhibited by me, was stated to have surpassed in size any animal exhibited, and not one word about his being well fed. I considered this to be an insimulation that was not correct: I felt that in the first place I had not been well used, by the Ox not been allowed to compete after I had taken the pains to feed, and bring forward such an animal, as the Island had never produced before; and secondly, the insinuation of his only surpassing is size the other animals brought forward, which was calculated to convey a wrong impression to the public. I therefore, on my own responsibility, took my pencil and drew it across the two words in question, without any living being beside myself knowing anything about it, or being in any way privy to it.

I felt myself ill-used, therefore I did that which, under any other circumstances, I should not have done.
