LOCAL & OTHER ITEMS.

The winter time table on the P. E. I. Railway went into effect on Monday last, 8th inst.

Two perceptible earthquakes were felt at Yarmouth on the 6th. Houses shook and dishes rattled.

At West Jeffrey, Mass., four boys were drowned on the 5th inst., by a double runner coasting sled breaking through the ice on Cointoocook river.

The old Trappist monastery at St. Norbert, Manitoba, was destroyed by fire on the 4th inst. Loss is placed at \$25,000, with \$6,000 insurance.

St. Francis Xavier's Catholic Church at Warwick, Maryland, built 225 years ago, in Lord Baltimore's time, was destroyed by fire last Monday morning.

The Supreme Court opened here yesterday. The only case in which the Grand Jury found a true bill was one for breaking windows. That is the only criminal case before the court.

Owing to the storm yesterday, the attendance at the market was very small. With the exception of some of the butchers, there was no one doing business in the inside market.

The St. Vincent de Paul Station on the C. P. R., not far from Montreal, was run into on Monday morning, by the Quebec train, which crossed the switch. Three passengers and a brakeman were killed, and several others were injured.

At Syracuse, N. Y., on the 4th inst., burglars entered the Catholic Cathedral, robbed the poor boxes and ransacked the vestment cases, and then set fire to the church. Only the timely discovery of the flames prevented a serious fire.

Mr. R. H. Campbell, Principal of West Kent School in this city, has been appointed Superintendent of Education for this Province in succession to Dr. Anderson. Mr. Campbell has been a teacher for twenty-five years and has rendered excellent service in the profession.

Sudden Death at Summerside.

Summerside, Jan. 9.—(Special by phone). A very sudden death took place here this afternoon about five o'clock when Robert L. Romeke passed away.

Mr. Romeke who was in the employ of the freight department of the P. E. I. R., had arrived home to supper and was about to sit down to the table when his wife noticed him yawning, about to fall. She attempted to catch him, but fell and was killed.

Deceased who was about 70 years of age leaves a widow and two children; Grace in Winnipeg and Louis at home.—Gazette.

New Accomodation

Ottawa, Jan. 5.—The government will place in the estimates to be brought down when Parliament resumes next week an appropriation of \$100,000 for the block to be erected in Ottawa, to house the branches and departments now housed in various rented buildings throughout the city. At present \$350,000 is paid out in these rentals.

Ask for Bounties on Steel

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—A deputation representing the iron and steel industry of Canada waited on the government this afternoon and had a protracted conference. There were present J. H. Plummer, head of the Dominion Iron and Steel Company; Mr. Robson, for the Dominion Iron and Steel Company; and George E. Drummond for the Algoma Company. The Steel men appeared with their counsel in an effort to obtain from the new government a restoration of the iron and steel bounties and further encouragement for the industry. They presented a mass of material in the form of statistics, showing the actual degree of prosperity enjoyed by the industry under present conditions.

The bounties paid on iron and steel in the last fiscal year amounted to \$3,188,775. The iron and steel bounties were paid for twenty-eight years before finally cut off by the late government. The bounties on pig iron, steel and puddle bars expired a year ago and the last bounty, that on wire rods, being paid on the last day of June 1911.

The deputation left the east block at six o'clock without having received any assurance from the government. There is a rather strong probability that the whole question will be turned over to the tariff commission soon to be established. In the event it is understood the government does not intend to make any changes this session.

Declare Transfer Invalid

Ottawa, Jan. 5.—Word was received in the capital today from Winnipeg to the effect that the commission appointed by the Manitoba government to inquire into the sale by the Dominion government of the St. Peter's reserve near Winnipeg had declared the transfer of the property from the Indians to other parties to be invalid.

The first objection to the sale was taken by G. H. Bradbury, Conservative member for Selkirk constituency, in which the reserve is located. He contended in the House that the Indians had been tricked out of their lands, which had been allowed to fall into the hands of the speculators.

Hon. Frank Oliver in defending the sale said that all the provisions of the law providing for the sale of Indian reserves had been strictly adhered to and that the Indians had no cause for complaint.

Of the three commissioners named by the Manitoba government to conduct the inquiry, all of whom are judges, two agree with the member for Selkirk, while the third upholds the contention of the former Minister of the Interior.

The commissioners reporting against the validity of the transaction find that Indians, as wards of the government, were not legally qualified to dispose of the land. They also find that the sale was not properly taken, a majority of the Indians not having declared in favor of disposing of the land.

The whole matter is complicated by the fact that the Manitoba government declares to issue title. Then a portion of the band of Indians which occupied the reserve has been moved to another reserve at considerable cost.

Mr. Bradbury, who is in Ottawa, is not surprised at the finding of the commission. The reserve, he said, consisted of 45,000 acres, which were disposed of for less than \$50,000. The surrender was put through without the Indians having been given a fair opportunity to consider the matter. The property was sold to four speculators, the general public having little or no opportunity to buy.

Pending the receipt of the full report, Hon. Robert Rogers, Minister of the Interior declined to make any comment and the officials of the Indian Department were equally silent.

Marquis Wheat.

The West has long sought a wheat that would approximate to the Red Fife in quality, and ripen ten days earlier. There is every indication that the farmers have found it in Marquis wheat. Mr. Walter Simpson, who is farming on a large scale near Moose Jaw, tells the Regina Standard that he had implicit faith in Marquis, as the wheat of the future in Western Canada.

Mr. Simpson had exceptional success with this wheat last season. His output yielded 85 1/2 bushels, without thrashing, notwithstanding the season's drawbacks. He is thoroughly satisfied that it is the equal of Red Fife in all the qualities that lent fame to the latter and is very superior in suitability to the climatic conditions of the prairie provinces and the great unprotected areas beyond the northern boundary of these Province and stretching far away into the high northwestern latitudes.

Just try to think," said Mr. Simpson, "what it means to Canada—this vast acreage it will add to our magnificent wheat growing area."
