Address to Fr. Clarke From the Christian Brothers.

Father Clarke paid a farewell visit to the Christian Brothers on Monday last. He spent a most agreeable day with the community at Mount St. Francis where he was entertained with that genial and whole-souled hospitality for which Irishmen and Newfoundlanders are remarkable. A joint address signed by Rev. A. P. Kennedy, Mt. St. Francis; Rev. P. J. Culhane, St. Bonaventure's College, and the Rev. J. F. Ennis, Industrial School, Mt. Cashel, was presented to him on behalf of the Christian Brothers of Newfoundland by the Superior of Mt. St. Francis, Mr. Kennedy.

Father Clarke was much touched by the warm appreciation of his pastoral labours at Torbay by the community and he expressed his heartfelt thanks for the tribute of respect which was recorded in the Address, the expression of regrets at his impending departure and their kindly wishes for his future. We append the address:—

ADDRESS
From the Christian Brothers of Newfoundland to the Very Rev. M. J. Clarke, P. P., Torbay.

Very Rev. and Dear Father Clarke,—To-day the devoted people of your extensive Parish are in mourning at the thought of losing you, their beloved Pastor, who, for well nigh half a century, have by your saintly life, your ardent zeal, your varied talents, and your indomitable energy made Torbay the pride of the Catholic Church in Newfoundland, and the admiration of visitors from other lands.

To recount the great work done by you in the building of Churches, Halls and Schools; in the establishment of your grand Total Abstinence Society, and in elevating your Parish to the highest standard of excellence in everything relating to its spiritual, educational and material progress, is more than can be attempted in a brief address.

On this, the eve of your departure, when looking over the pages of the annuals of Torbay, you have great reason to rejoice that the seed sown by you during the forty years of your ministry, having fallen on good ground, and having been blessed by an all bountiful Providence has borne the "hundred fold." Whilst you did all that a faithful shepherd could have done for his flock, they on their part co-operated with you in your efforts for their advancement. Where you led they followed. By their loyalty, affection and docility they in a great measure recompensed you for your untiring and zealous labours on their behalf. Hence the parting is for them as for you an ordeal difficult to be borne.

But it is not your Parishioners alone that have reason to look forward with regret to your departure, your worth being recognised throughout Newfoundland. Few, however, will feel the separation more keenly than the members of our communities. Since our arrival from Ireland thirty-five years ago, we have been honoured by your friendship—a friendship as warm as it has been constant, and as constant as it has been sincere. Our intimate relations with you we shall cherish amongst the happiest recollections of our lives; and in the records of our Order your name will be inscribed as that of one of the truest friends it has been the privilege of our Institute to claim in any of many lands.

For centuries fervent missionaries from Ireland have followed the children of their race to distant climes, and who that has known your career will hesitate to give you an honoured place amongst the noblest of them! In this other Ireland which you have loved with an affection, not second to that which you bear for the Land of your birth, and to which you have given all the years of an active manhood, your memory will be revered for the learning, the culture and the virtues with which you have ever upheld the most treasured ideals of the Priesthood.

And now, dear Father Clarke, we fondly, yet reluctantly say adieu. We pray, that as the morning of your life was promising, its noontide glorious, so may its evening which you are to spend in lovely Erin be happy and

Temperance Petition.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—Now that there is a movement in the city of closing the saloons at 6 p.m. I would like you to give space in your invaluable paper to the following remarks:—

Everybody knows the evils resulting from the use of intoxicating liquors, and everybody will acknowledge, if not to others to themselves, that strong drink is one of the greatest curses of humanity, so I need not dwell on that. But there are those who are saying that the closing of the saloons at 6 p.m. will not remedy the existing state of affairs. I admit, Mr. Editor, that it is not what many would like to see, nevertheless it is a step in the right direction. It will benefit us. Many a man who when he cannot get into the saloons after six o'clock will take the money home, and give his wife part, if not all of his weekly pay.

On the Saturday that the saloons were closed at the late Local Option election, the merchants on Water Street did a larger trade than on that of any corresponding Saturday in any previous year. This must prove that our people would spend their money for the necessities of life if the saloons were closed in the night.

Only a few months ago there happened an incident which must still linger in the memories of many of us. I refer to the untimely death of Frank Dillon. One thing is certain, Mr.

Editor, that if the saloons had been closed at 6 p.m. then, that affair would not have happened, and Frank Dillon would not now be lying in a drunkard's grave; neither would the bread winner now be missing from his home. Who was responsible for his death? you may ask. Sir, I am of the opinion that many were responsible; not only the rum seller, but many of our so-called respectable citizens who voted against the petition in the last Local Option election; he who influenced others to do so; he who thought it was no business of his, did not vote at all; and he who had tented his premises for the sale of intoxicating liquors, as well as he who sold him the drink—all had a share in the dreadful deed; all are guilty before high heaven; everyone of them is as much a murderer as he who deliberately shoots another; and the blood of Frank Dillon rests upon their heads and I challenge anyone to deny it.

We cannot bring back those who have already been slain by King Alcohol, but can we not save those who are still left? Can we not by wise legislation prevent those who will come after us from filling a drunkard's grave, from going down to a drunkard's hell? Will not our Legislators do something to remove the misery that exists in our midst? We shall see when the petition is presented before the House of Assembly during the next few days.

Newfoundland Travellers.

Party Form an "En Route Club" at the Sydney Hotel—Miss May Furlong is the President—Clever St. John's Business Woman is Life of Party.

Newfoundland was well represented at the Sydney Hotel yesterday by a party of chance-assembled wayfarers, all of whom were anxiously waiting to take the Bruce for the last lap of their journey. Most of them were coming from the Old Country.

Among the number were J. W. Morris, Superintendent of the Reid Newfoundland Company's electrical plant, and Mrs. Morris; Miss May Furlong, Alex. Robertson of Bishop & Sons; A. K. Lundman of the Jas. Baird Co., Ltd.; J. Taylor, of the Wm. Frew Co., and R. White, Inspector of Light-houses. John F. Stewart, of Edinburgh, was also bound for Newfoundland in connection with the exploitation of timber limits.

Mr. White had been here several days ago to take the Bruce, and finding that she had gone to St. John's, went back to Halifax to get the Durango, which was scheduled to sail to St. John's on March 21st. When he got there he found that the Durango had been frozen up in St. John's harbor for three days.

The Newfoundlanders formed an en route club of their own, the president and pride of which was Miss Furlong, who has been to London and Paris to buy for her millinery stores.

The gentlemen of the party tell with great gusto of Miss Furlong's business ability. One of them, whose firm also sells millinery, goes as far as to say that she was clever enough to sell at double the price the identical goods in which a customer would turn him down.

The gentlemen were Miss Furlong's guests yesterday afternoon for a tandem drive to North Sydney. After the

return, the men began edging around to pay the driver, but the lady detected them and pulled the driver away, insisting on paying the fares herself. "It's no uses talking to her," said the men from Newfoundland.

The pride of the Newfoundlanders survived in spite of a heavy blow which was dealt out to one of their number in London. Mr. Lundman bought a lady's costume, and the clerk asked him if he would have it sent home. "Well, you can send it to Newfoundland if you like," said the purchaser.
