### Cable News.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Oct. 13. The British Red Cross Society is preparing to send large contingents to the front.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day. War in the Balkans is now only a matter of a few hours. The replies of Balkan States to Powers' note virtually rejecting intervention, will be delivered at the various capitals today, and at the same time a note practically in the shape of an ultimatum will be sent to Turkey, demanding autonomy for the Macedonian provinces. According to a reliable dispatch from Rome, the Balkan coalition will make a demand which it will be impossible for the Porte to accept, namely that reforms be executed under the control of European Powers and the Balkan States and a pledge that the Porte assent to an immediate demobilization of Turkish forces. It is understood that the Porte will be given until Tuesday to reply. Therefore there is every probability of general hostilities before the weekend. Serbian dispatch reports that the movement of the Bulgarian army has already begun. Montenegrins forces continuing their advance, have captured Bylopolje, an important strategic point to northwest of Bereane after desperate fighting. They are now on their way to Sieniza, thirty miles northeast of Hylopolje and close to the Serbian frontier against which they direct attack. It is in this direction that the Montenegrins expect to join with the Serbian army while it advances from the north. According to a Constantinople dispatch, Essay Pasha has arrived at Scutari with reinforcements raising the garrison from 12,000 to 20,000 men. If this news is true, the Montenegrins will have a difficult task of capturing Scutari.

### Why Who's Who.

Probably the most docile and obedient pompadour to be found in this country adorns the head of "Fighting Bob" La Follette, the Wisconsin senator who is just now bombarding the Tatt and Roosevelt camps with sortily but most brightly lashed epigrams in his possession. Those who have heard Senator La Follette when his bristles are in good working order will have to admit that he is some porcupine with the mother tongue. The senator has had his pompadour for a long time and never gets it even in his sleep. As a rule, this coiffeur lies back at an angle of forty-five degrees, in a peaceful, recumbent position, but when the senator utters his battery of ripid adjectives, viridictive personal pronouns and fervent epithets it rises to its feet and stands erect in a stiff and defiant attitude.

Senator La Follette comes honestly by his nickname. He has had to fight for everything he ever got and for a lot of things he didn't get. When he broke into the senate, he was about as welcome as a pegglegged man at a swell hop. He was immediately labeled as an untamed joke, and his audiences consisted of the reading clerk and the surrounding ozone.

They have had quite a change of scenery in the senate in the past three or four years, however, and now whenever Senator "Bob" gets up to deliver some astringent sayings, nobody ducks into the cloak room and giggles. As a matter of fact, there are a few resonant giggles left in the senate, anyway. Senator La Follette has made a couple of scoring starts for the presidency, but being unable to count a quorum of delegates threw a shoe at the first quarter and retired with considerable precipitancy. He is a young man, however, and is good for two or three more heats.

One thing can be said about the Wisconsin senator—he has placed a bunch of progressive laws on the statute books of his state which none of his critics has ventured to rise up and attempt to repeal.

### Bad Weather Prevents Parade.

The projected parade of the Knights of Columbus, in a body to pass mass at the R. C. Cathedral yesterday, had to be abandoned owing to inclement weather. Most of the members, however, were present and held seats in the Sanctuary. Rev. Dr. Kitchen occupied the pulpit, and eloquently epitomized the history of the organization. He referred to the splendid work done in other countries by the Knights and felt sure that the Brethren here would emulate the charitable and philanthropic acts of those of the neighboring continent. Among other things which might be consummated was the erection of a Home of Refuge.

### Saturday's Football Matches

Felldians Defeat St. Bon's and City Team Went Down to Bad Defeat to Navy.

St. George's Field was the scene of two interesting football matches on Saturday afternoon. One was for inter-Collegiate between the Felldians and St. Bon's, followed by the Cornwall vs. City contest. Despite the coolness of the weather the football arena was well sprinkled with onlookers, most of whom were navy supporters. At three o'clock the college commenced. Right at the outset the Bishop Felld boys became aggressive. They easily outclassed their opponents and in a short time notched up three goals. After this the St. Bon's worked with determination to equalize but their efforts were futile. However, before the final whistle sounded they succeeded in finding the net once while the Felldians added two more goals to their score and the match ended five to one in favor of the Felldians. The game on the whole was fast and exciting. After a brief interval the Cornwall and City teams entered the field. This contest had been looked forward to with much interest by city supporters as well as those of the navy, but there was general disappointment over the outcome of the struggle, which resulted in a decided win for the Cornwall by six goals to nil. This defeat, however was a decy for the fact that the full strength could not be obtained, owing to the lateness of the season and the day of the week. The navy boys won the toss and took the advantage of a slight breeze of wind. For the first ten minutes honours were evenly divided, the Cornwall were evidently getting used to the field. The visitors, cheered by their enthusiastic supporters, put on steam. The forward line combined splendidly,—indeed it was some of the prettiest combination we have seen here for some time—and in less than five minutes netted two goals in quick succession. This stirred up the city boys. Quick and L'yon got in some good work. They made several dashes up field but the navy back division was invulnerable. Soon after the half time whistle sounded and ends were changed. At the opening the city team rushed matters, Pike, Quick and Brien showing good work. The balance of the home team been as good as these three players better results would have been obtained. The latter part of the game was entirely in favour of the navy. They displayed clever combination play and made their score reach a half dozen goals. The Cornwall team played a clean game well worth witnessing and deserved their victory. Mr. W. J. Higgins acted as referee. The city team were: Walsh, goal; Hart, Duggan, backs; Brien, Hallett, Stick, Pike, halves; Brophy, Quick, Churchill and Trebble forwards.
