



Copenhagen.

The announcement by the Hamburg-American line that they intend to establish a line between Hamburg and Copenhagen is somewhat strange. It suggests the use of Copenhagen as an entrepot for goods in transit to Germany. We have no doubt that Copenhagen has been used as such a mart during the past five months. But it is curious that the shipping company itself should draw attention to any such use of Copenhagen, for it is giving notice to the fleets of Britain and her allies to keep their eyes on contraband goods shipped to Copenhagen. We have little doubt that a strict watch has been kept on this traffic and particularly that which is carried on across the Atlantic, for in former wars, Copenhagen has played the same role. Her people are fully entitled to deal with the belligerents in contraband and the belligerents have the right to seize the contraband if they can. The chance of seizure between Copenhagen and Hamburg via the Kiel Canal is very small. The only practicable course is to seize goods shipped to Copenhagen from Atlantic ports, which are suspected as being intended for transshipment to Germany. In the early French wars of the revolutionary period, Copenhagen became the great entrepot for a contraband trade in the Baltic. But Denmark became involved in the war and Great Britain attacked it and in the Battle of the Baltic, Nelson destroyed the Danish Fleet. This was in 1801. A British Admiral, James Gambler, also seized the Danish fleet in 1807 in his attack on Copenhagen, six years later. In view of the watch the British fleet can keep on the Atlantic trade with Copenhagen, it is unlikely that sufficient contraband can get through to keep a line of steamers running. It is more than likely that Copenhagen is being used as a gigantic warehouse to collect goods from Norway and Sweden, and the island of Zealand itself for transshipment to Germany. It is well situated for such a purpose and its harbor is one of the best seaports in the Baltic or the Sound. Its population is close on half a million and its exports consist of butter, bacon, corn, coffee, sugar, coal, metals, and petroleum. It may be remembered that early in the war German agents were endeavouring to divert to Germany a large portion of the dairy trade which is carried on with Britain. They tried to do this by offering higher prices than the British were paying. It is not unlikely that some of this trade, which is extensive, for the Danes had established a complete ascendancy in the dairy trade in Great Britain, has been so diverted. If so, it offers an excellent opening for the co-operative dairy enterprises in Ireland, which have in recent years been developed there, largely on the Danish plan. It is an ill-wind that blows good to no one, and the diver-

tion of Danish produce to Germany will leave openings for Irish produce in Britain. We believe that the establishment of the new Hamburg-American line spells such a diversion and will not spell much in the way of contraband trade with the United States.
