Hungary is a small patch of ground a the dorsal region of Europe which as been messing up history with great success for a thousand years. There are eight prominent nationalities in Hungary. each of which could give a lot to be able to boot the other seven out. In consequence of this, the Hungarian parliament resembles an old-fashioned New York caucus just before the rict call goes in, and Hungarian cititens in search of peace have been emigrating to the United States at the rate of 150,000 a year. To offset this, a million Russians have recently emigrated to Hungary, through the Carathians, but not for the nursuit of griculture and the arts.



The Hungarians are simple quiet folk at home who dress in passionate colors on feast days, and till the soil in a sketchy and laborious manner the rest of the time. Hungary's twenty million people do not roduce as much in the crop line as the 1.700.000 people of Kansas. 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
