### Killed Instantly

WHEN HIT BY RUNNING COAL BOX

JAMES HIBBS, EMPLOYED AS  
LANDING TENDER, LOST HIS  
LIFE.

(Sydney Post.)

GLACE BAY, Dec. 9.—The second  
fatal accident to take place at Domin-  
ion No. 2 mine within two weeks oc-  
curred yesterday afternoon when  
James Hibbs, employed as a landing  
tender lost his life.

The accident happened around three  
o'clock just as the mine was through  
for the day and as far as can be learn-  
ed, the unfortunate man was on his  
way out the deep when he was struck  
by a full box of coal. The accident  
happened in No. 2 South Deep. The  
deceased, who has been employed in  
No. 2 mine for the past few years was  
regarded by officials of the mine as a  
very careful employee, and his death com-  
ing as it did, will be a great shock to  
his parents and fellow employees.

The deceased who is a native of  
Newfoundland came to Cape Breton  
about ten years ago with his parents  
and has resided at New Aberdeen since  
that time. He was 25 years of age and  
unmarried. Besides his parents, he  
leaves to mourn his loss several brothers  
and sisters. Mrs. Leander Poole of  
New Aberdeen, is a sister.

dissatisfied. Make your resolution  
now, that when the death call comes,  
it will find you at work at something.  
Never let the rust gather. Take some  
of your pleasures as you go along.  
Take some to-day. Make each day

what tomorrow will bring forth. You  
are given the present to do with as  
you will. "The tomorrow is not yours  
for certain." Yes, work. But do  
not postpone all day so far into the

### Curzon Finds Ray of Hope in Europe.

LONDON—While the recent address  
of Lord Curzon, Secretary for foreign  
affairs, to an audience of business men  
in the City, dealt in large measure  
with the actual political situation the  
Near East, the speaker also expressed  
some interesting ideas as to conditions  
on the Continent. He does not believe  
that the future outlook of economic  
Europe is one of unrelieved gloom. "I  
see the little nations of Europe push-  
ing forward to a greater life of in-  
ternational unity during the next few  
years," said Lord Curzon. "In the  
states of Czechoslovakia, Jugos-  
lavia, Rumania, Poland and Finland,  
and in the Baltic States, I see sym-  
ptoms of life and energy, and the growth  
of a strong sense of national indepen-  
dence and power. But on the other  
hand if I look at the great powers,  
whether they emerged triumphant  
from the war or whether they were  
broken up by the disasters  
that ensued, I find that they are  
in a position of much  
greater dislocation and disturbance.  
Take our own country. Our financial  
position is much stronger, with the  
exception of America, than any other  
State that took part in the war. But  
at the same time we have a burden  
upon every man in this country."

### FRANCE WEIGHED DOWN.

"France is weighed with a heavy  
debt and is sore about reparations.  
Germany is in a position of political  
instability and, is debilitated by the  
utter collapse of her exchange. Rus-  
sia is still outside the comity of na-  
tions, because she cannot make up her  
mind to accept the conditions which  
render admission to that comity pos-  
sible and desirable. She is still en-  
amoured of communism, and persists  
in pursuing her communistic propa-  
ganda in every part of the world.  
Austria was saved only by the inter-  
ception of the powers when on the  
verge of perishing. Italy has been  
concerned with more than one con-  
volution and change of Government.  
What an ambition it would be for the  
statesmen of the great powers to com-  
bine and survey this situation; to  
liquidate it section by section; gradu-  
ally to take the various pieces of the  
jig-saw puzzle which are lying about  
and fit them in their own places, and  
once more present a picture of a  
peaceful and united Europe."
