1. No person shall sell, or offer or expose for sale within the District of St. John's, any milk or cream without having first ab-Health Officer.

2. All licenses shall be for the period of one year, commencing on the first day of June in each year. Licenses shall be granted free of Any person who shall sell or of-

fer or expose for sale in the District of St. John's any milk or cream without having first obtained a license in accorda with the provisions of these Regulations, shall be liable for every such offence to a penalty not exceeding twenty-five dollars or to imprisonment for a period net exceeding one month.
